CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

Dear Shareholders.

On behalf of the Board of Directors, it is my pleasure to present to you the Group's result for the financial year ended 31 March 2020 ("FY2020").

FY2020 has been a challenging year. In the 4^{th} quarter of the financial year, we witnessed the COVID-19 pandemic and arising from it, unprecedent economic uncertainties and challenges.

Total revenue for FY2020 was \$\$62.2 million, a decrease of 9.6% from \$\$68.8 million in FY2019. The decrease in FY2020 revenue as compared to FY2019 was due to lower reported sales for the Group's core chlor-alkali products in the industrial chemicals segment.

Excluding the effects of fair value adjustments on its investment properties, the Group recorded a net profit after tax of S\$4.6 million in FY2020 as compared to S\$2.8 million in FY2019, i.e. an improvement of 64%.

Group net profit after tax for FY2020 came in at S\$3.4 million as compared to S\$10.7 million in FY2019. The decline in profitability was attributed to the loss of S\$1.2 million in fair value adjustments on the Group's investment properties as opposed to the gain of S\$7.9 million in FY2019. As a result of lower profitability, earnings per share decreased from 14.07 cents in FY2019 to 4.42 cents in FY2020.

Our balance sheet remained healthy, we ended the year with cash and cash equivalents of \$\$31.8 million. As at 31 March 2020, the Group had net assets of \$\$121 million and the net asset value per share of the Group increased slightly by 3 cents to \$\$1.59.

OPERATING AND FINANCIAL REVIEW

The Group derives its revenue from two business segments, namely industrial chemicals and properties. For the year under review, sale of industrial chemicals accounted for 97.6% (FY2019: 97.9%) of total revenue.

INDUSTRIAL CHEMICALS

Revenue for the industrial chemicals segment decreased by \$\$6.7 million to \$\$60.7 million in FY2020, as compared to revenue of \$\$67.4 million in FY2019. The decrease in revenue was mainly attributed to cyclical change in pricing of chlor-alkali products as well as lower demand.

Despite the decrease in revenue, the industrial chemicals segment reported a segmental profit before tax of S\$4.5 million in FY2020 as compared to S\$2.3 million in FY2019. The higher profit was mainly attributed to lower depreciation cost in FY2020 as certain plant and equipment were fully depreciated in 1st half of FY2020 and gain in exchange differences arising from appreciation of United States Dollar against Singapore Dollar in FY2020.

The development of our chemical process plant in Myanmar had been completed in December 2019 with commercial operations commenced in March 2020. The operations of Myanmar chemical process plant did not have a significant impact on the performance of the industrial chemicals segment as it is only one month of operations in FY2020.

PROPERTIES

Revenue for the properties segment remained relatively stable, with marginal increase of \$\$100,000 to \$\$1.5 million in FY2020. The segment, however, posted a segmental loss before tax of \$\$168,000 as it recorded a fair value loss of \$\$1.2 million in FY2020 as compared to a fair value gain of \$\$7.9 million in FY2019.

NON-SEGMENTAL

In FY2020, the Group posted an interest income of \$\$337,000 (FY2019: \$\$227,000) arising from additional placement of fixed deposits with financial institutions. Group dividend income increased to \$\$41,000 in FY2020 as compared to \$\$32,000 in FY2019.

Group's finance costs rose significantly to S\$199,000 as a result of adoption of SFRS(I) 16 *Leases*. On adoption of SFRS(I) 16, the Group recognised lease liabilities for all operating lease commitments that was previously off-balance sheet. Correspondingly, interest cost in relation to the lease liabilities were recognised in FY2020.

Arising from the above, the Group recorded a net profit before tax of S\$4.5 million (FY2019: S\$11.4 million).

MOVING FORWARD

As announced by the Ministry of Trade and Industry, the impact of COVID-19 on Singapore economy has been broad and significant, affecting different sectors of the economy to varying degrees. The Group's industrial chemicals segment which primarily operate in Singapore would likewise be affected.

In addition, local demand for our chlor-alkali products remain stagnant and the competitiveness of the industry remained unchanged. The industrial chemicals business continues to operate amidst competitive conditions with more intense price competition.

Arising from the COVID-19 (Temporary Measures) Act in relation to rental waiver, rental income from properties segment is forecasted to be lower in FY2021. In addition, in light of the current economic uncertainties, market sentiments on properties remain largely cautious and these may result in lower valuation of the investment properties in FY2021.

The Group shall monitor closely the ongoing situation and will implement various measures to manage costs and mitigate the effects.

As part of our efforts to improve on revenue and profitability for the Group, a subsidiary, Chem Integrated Management Pte Ltd ("CIMPL") with its principal activities on treatment and disposal of waste (including remediation activities) and manufacture of water treatment, waste treatment and oilfield chemicals, has been incorporated on 16 June 2020, funded through internal resources.

Despite the relatively gloomy outlook, the Group is confident to meet the challenges ahead and with our strong cash position, we will be able to seize opportunities when it arises.

DIVIDEND

For FY2020, the Board of Directors has recommended a final dividend (one-tier tax exempt) of 1.5 cents per ordinary share, subject to shareholders' approval at the annual general meeting to be held on 14 August 2020. The final dividend of 1.5 Singapore cents represents approximately 27.5% dividend payout of the Company's FY2020 net profit after tax.

STATEMENT OF CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

The Board of Directors (the "Board") of Chemical Industries (Far East) Limited (the "Company") and its subsidiaries (the "Group") are committed to achieve high standards of corporate governance. We recognise that good corporate governance enhances accountability and protects the interests of shareholders.

This report sets out the Company's corporate governance practices with reference to the Code of Corporate Governance 2018 (the "Code"). The Company has complied in all material aspects with the principles and provisions of the Code.

BOARD MATTERS

Principle 1: Board's Conduct of its Affairs Effective Board to head the Company

Provision 1.1 Role of the Board

The Directors are fiduciaries who must act objectively in the best interests of the Company. The Board has put in place a code of conduct and ethics to set appropriate tone-from-the-top and desired organisational culture, and ensures proper accountability within the Group. Directors facing conflicts of interest recuse themselves from discussions and decisions involving the issues of conflict.

The principal functions of the Board include, inter alia,

- (a) providing entrepreneurial leadership, setting strategic objectives;
- (b) ensuring necessary resources are in place for the Company to meet its strategic objectives;
- (c) monitoring Management's performance;
- (d) establishing a framework for prudent and effective control for risk management;
- (e) safeguarding shareholders' interests and the Company's assets;
- (f) setting values and standards (including ethical standards) for the Company; and
- (g) ensuring transparency and accountability to key stakeholder groups.

The Board recognises that, to ensure that the business is sustainable, the Company has to strike a balance between its business needs and the needs of the society and the environment in which it operates. The Board considers sustainability issues in its strategy formulation. The Company has posted its Sustainability Report for FY2019 through SGXNET on 12 June 2019. The Company will post its Sustainability Report for FY2020 by end of August 2020.

Provision 1.2

Directors' Duties and Responsibilities

The Directors must understand the Company's business as well as their directorship duties (including their roles as executive, non-executive and independent directors). The Directors must comply and ensure the Company complies with legislative and regulatory requirements. The Directors have each signed the respective undertaking in the form set out in Appendix 7.7 of the Listing Manual of the Singapore Exchange Securities Trading Limited ("SGX-ST") to undertake to use their best endeavours to comply with the Listing Rules and to procure that the Company shall so comply. The Directors have also procured a similar undertaking from the Chief Financial Officer and the General Manager in their capacities as Executive Officers.

The Company has in place a process of induction, training and development for both new and existing Directors.

Orientation, Briefings, and trainings provided for Directors

A new Director appointed to the Board will be briefed by the Chairman on his/her duties and obligations, and on the Group's organisation structure, business and governance practices. He/She will also meet up with senior management to familiarize himself, thereby facilitating Board interaction and independent access to senior management. If he/she is a first-time director of a listed company, he/she must undergo training in the roles and responsibilities of a director of a listed issuer as prescribed by the SGX-ST. Mr Yeo Hock Chye, a first-time director who was appointed to the Board 1 July 2019 had undergone the prescribed training. Mr Lim Yew Nghee, (appointed on 27 December 2019), Mr Sng Peng Chye and Mr Chua Chin Kiat (both appointed on 13 July 2020) being first-time directors will undergo the prescribed training within the first year of their appointment.

The Directors are continually and regularly updated on the Group's businesses and governance practices, including changes in laws and regulations, financial reporting standards and Code of Corporate Governance so as to enable Directors to effectively discharge their duties.

For FY2020, updates on the Group's business and strategic developments were presented by the Executive Directors, updates to changes and developments in accounting standards were presented by the external auditors and regulatory changes to the Listing Rules and Code of Corporate Governance were presented by the Company Secretary.

All Directors are also encouraged to be members of the Singapore Institute of Directors ("SID") and for them to receive journal updates and training from SID. Information on training programs, seminars and workshops organized by various professional bodies and organisations were circulated to the Directors on a regular basis; some of which the Directors have attended or participated during the year.

The Board meets at least twice a year and as warranted by circumstances, as deemed appropriate by the Board members. The Board ensures that Directors with other listed board representations give sufficient time and attention to the affairs of the Group.

Provision 1.6

Management providing information to Board

Directors are provided with complete, adequate and timely information prior to Board meetings and on an on-going basis. Such information is circulated at least 7 days in advance of each meeting and it includes financial reports, disclosure documents, explanatory information, key developments and other matters requiring the Board's decision. The Board is kept informed of material events and transactions as and when they occur in a timely manner.

Every Board member has separate and independent access to management. They are entitled to request from management additional information.

Provision 1.7

Board's Access to Management, Company Secretary and External Advisers

Besides Management, the Board has separate and independent access to the Company Secretary at all times. The role of the Company Secretary is clearly defined and the Company Secretary is present at Board meetings to respond to the queries from any Director and to assist in ensuring that Board procedures as well as applicable rules and regulations are followed. The appointment and the removal of the Company Secretary are subject to the Board's approval.

The Board takes independent professional advice as and when necessary, at the Company's expense, concerning any aspect of the Group's operations or undertakings in order to discharge its responsibilities effectively.

BOARD COMPOSITION AND GUIDANCE

Principle 2: Independence and diversity in the composition of the Board

Provision 2.1 Independent Directors

At the end of FY2020 on 31 March 2020, the Board comprises seven directors, of whom three are Independent Directors. At the date of this annual report, the Board comprises nine Directors, five of whom are Independent Directors with one of them being a Lead Independent Director.

The criterion for independence is based on the definition given in the Code and in the Listing Rules of SGX-ST. The Code has defined an "independent" director as one who is independent in conduct, character and judgement and has no relationship with the Company, its related corporations, its substantial shareholders or its officers that could interfere, or be reasonably perceived to interfere, with the exercise of the director's independent business judgment with a view to the best interests of the Company. Under the Listing Rules of SGX-ST, an independent director is not one who is or has been employed by the Company or any of its related corporations for the current or any of the past three financial years; or not one who has an immediate family member who is, or has been in any of the past three financial years, employed by the Company or any of its related corporations and whose remuneration is determined by the RC.

The NC reviews annually, and as and when circumstances require, if a Director is independent based on the provisions of the Code and the Listing Rules of SGX-ST. Each Independent Director is required to complete a declaration form of independence based on the guidelines provided in the Code. The declaration form also requires the Director to make declaration on any relationships or circumstances, including those identified by the Code, that are relevant in the determination of whether a Director is independent.

The five Independent Directors have declared themselves to be independent. Having reviewed the declarations of independence by the Independent Directors, the NC is of the view the Independent Directors, namely Dr Wan Soon Bee, Mrs Elaine Lim, Mr Yeo Hock Chye, Mr Sng Peng Chye and Mr Chua Chin Kiat have none of the relationships or circumstances as stated in the Code or the Listing Rules of SGX-ST that would otherwise deemed them not to be independent.

Dr Wan Soon Bee has served for more than nine years on the Board. The independence of the independent directors must be based on the substance of their professionalism, integrity, and objectivity, and not merely based on form; such as the number of years which they have served on the Board. The NC has assessed the independence of Dr Wan and is satisfied that there is no relationship or other factors such as business dealings, financial dependence or relationship with the Group or the Group's management, etc. which would impair his independent judgement. Based on its assessment, the NC has concluded that Dr Wan continues to maintain independence in his oversight role. Dr Wan Soon Bee did not participate in the rigorous review by the Board process and had abstained from the Board's deliberation of his independence.

Each of the Independent Directors abstained from the deliberations of the NC on his independence.

Provisions 2.2 and 2.3

Composition of Independent Directors and Non-Executive Directors on the Board

Under Provision 2.2 of the Code, the independent directors should make up majority of the Board where the Chairman is not independent. Under Provision 2.3 of the Code, the Non-Executive Directors should make up a majority of the Board.

The five Independent Directors out of a Board of nine members make up majority of the Board. The Board has six Non-Executive Directors which comprise the majority of the Board.

The Independent directors led by a Lead Independent Director provide a good balance of authority and power within the Board. In addition, the NC, AC and RC which assist the Board in its functions is each chaired by an Independent Director.

Provision 2.4 Board size and diversity

At the date of this annual report, the current Board has nine members, five of whom are Independent Directors. The Board members as a group provide appropriate mix of experience, expertise and attributes that facilitate balanced, objective and effective decision making.

The Board concluded that its size and diversity are appropriate taking into consideration the scope and nature of operations of the Group.

The profiles of the directors are disclosed in page 21 to 25 of this Annual Report.

Provision 2.5 Role of Non-Executive Directors

For FY2020, the Non-Executive Directors constructively challenged and helped to develop proposals on investment and business strategies. The performance of the management in meeting the agreed investment and business strategies were also monitored and reviewed by the Non-Executive Directors. The Non-Executive Directors (including the Independent Directors) communicate among themselves without the presence of Management as and when the need arises, and where applicable provide feedback to the Board and the Chairman.

CHAIRMAN AND MANAGING DIRECTOR

Principle 3: Clear division of responsibilities between the leadership of the Board and the management of the Company

Provisions 3.1 and 3.2 Chairman and Chief Executive Officer (CEO)

Mr Lim Soo Peng, the founder of the Company, is the Chairman of the Board and Managing Director (equivalent to CEO) of the Company. While the roles of Chairman and CEO are held by Mr Lim Soo Peng, the responsibilities of Chairman and CEO are separate and distinct.

As Chairman of the Board, his responsibilities include leading the Board to ensure its effectiveness, setting the Board agenda in consultation with Board members, the control of the quality and timeliness of data and information to the Board and promoting high standards of the Code and adherence to the Listing Rules and other regulatory requirements.

As Managing Director, Mr Lim Soo Peng manages and develops the businesses of the Group and implements the Board's decision. He undertakes the executive responsibilities of the Group's performance.

Provision 3.3 Lead Independent Director

Mr Tay Kah Chye, was the Lead Independent Director from 18 May 2016 to 28 June 2019. Mr Yeo Hock Chye was appointed the Lead Independent Director on 12 May 2020. The Lead Independent Director is available as a channel of communication between shareholders if they have concerns relating to matters that contact through the Chairman, Managing Director, Executive Directors or the Chief Financial Officer have failed to resolve or such contact is inappropriate.

The Board is of the opinion that the Lead Independent Director strengthens the independence in the Board and there are adequate safeguards are in place to prevent considerable concentration of power.

BOARD MEMBERSHIP

Principle 4: Formal and transparent process for appointment of Directors

Provisions 4.1 and 4.2 Nominating Committee

The Nominating Committee ("NC") comprises three members all of whom are independent.

Lee Kia Jong Elaine (Mrs Elaine Lim) (NC Chairman) Dr Wan Soon Bee Yeo Hock Chye⁽¹⁾ Lim Soo Peng⁽²⁾

The role of the NC is to make recommendations to the Board on all Board appointments and re-appointments.

The key responsibilities of the NC are to make recommendations to the Board relating to:

- the appropriate size of the Board and the relevant mix of expertise and experience within the Board;
- the Board succession plans, in particular for the Chairman and the Managing Director, and key management personnel;
- the development of a process for evaluation of the performance of the Board, the Board committees and the Directors;
- the review of training and professional development programme for the Board and the Directors;
- the appointment and re-appointment of directors; and
- the review of the independence of the Independent Directors.

As part of the selection, appointment and re-appointment process, the NC takes into consideration each Director's competencies, commitment, contribution and performance, including, if applicable, as an Independent Director.

Provision 4.3

Process for the selection, appointment and re-appointment of Directors

The NC reviews the composition of the Board on an annual basis, and as and when circumstances require, to ensure that the Board is of the appropriate size and has the relevant mix of expertise and experience.

When the need for a new Director arises, nominations will be reviewed by the NC who will then forward to the Board for approval and the new Director is appointed by way of a Board resolution.

Under the Company's Constitution, one-third of the Directors (excluding any new Directors appointed during the year) shall retire from office each year by rotation. The retiring directors are eligible for re-election. In addition, any new Directors appointed by the Board will have to retire at the Annual General Meeting ("AGM") following his appointment and be eligible for re-election.

In accordance with the Constitution, Mr Lim Yew Khang Cecil and Ms Lee Kia Jong (Mrs Elaine Lim) will retire at the forthcoming AGM by rotation and be eligible for re-election. Ms Lee Kia Jong (Mrs Elaine Lim) has informed the Board that she will not seek re-election to allow for refreshment of the Board. Mr Cecil Lim has consented to stand for re-election. In accordance with the Company's Constitution, Mr Yeo Hock Chye and Mr Lim Yew Nghee as new Directors appointed by the Board on 1 July 2019 and 27 December 2019 respectively will retire and be eligible for re-election at the forthcoming AGM. Both have consented to stand for-re-election.

Taking into account their attendance and participation at Board meetings, the NC is satisfied that Mr Lim Yew Khang Cecil, Mr Yeo Hock Chye and Mr Lim Yew Nghee have committed their time to effectively discharge their responsibilities and duties as Directors. The NC has recommended their re-election. The Board has accepted the NC's recommendations. Mr Yeo Hock Chye being a NC member has abstained from the NC's and Board's deliberations and decision on his re-election. Mr Lim Yew Khang Cecil and Mr Lim Yew Nghee have both abstained from the Board's deliberations and decision on their re-election.

Mr Sng Peng Chye and Mr Chua Chin Kiat are new Directors appointed by the Board on 13 July 2020. Having reviewed their background and experience, the NC views that they would contribute to the diversity of skills and competencies and recommended their appointment as Independent Directors which were approved by the Board. In accordance with the Company's Constitution, they will retire at the forthcoming AGM following their appointment and be eligible for re-election. They have consented to their re-election.

In accordance with the Listing Rules of SGX-ST, the information as set out in Appendix 7.4.1 of the Listing Manual in respect of the Directors standing for re-election at the forthcoming AGM are provided on pages 88 to 92 of this Annual Report.

Provision 4.4 Review of Directors' independence

The NC determines, on an annual basis, and as and when circumstances require, if a Director is independent.

In FY2020, the NC conducted its annual review on the independence of the Independent Directors, using the criteria of independence in the Code and the Listing Rules of SGX-ST and respective Independent Directors' self-declaration. Accordingly, the NC has ascertained that they are independent.

Provision 4.5 Multiple board representations

The NC ensures that new Directors are aware of their duties and obligations. The NC also assesses if a Director is able to and has been adequately carrying out his or her duties as a Director of the Company, taking into account his principal commitments and other directorships in other listed companies.

The NC does not consider it appropriate to set a limit on the number of directorships that a Director may hold because individual circumstances and capacity of each Director are different. The NC respects each Director as a professional and leaves it to his/her personal assessment on the demands of competing directorships and obligations and whether he/she can still serve effectively.

Details of the Directors' principal commitments and outside directorships are set out in the segment on the Board of Directors of this Annual Report.

BOARD PERFORMANCE

Principle 5: Formal assessment of the effectiveness of the Board and contributions of each director

Provisions 5.1 &5.2

Board evaluation and performance criteria

In evaluating the Board's performance, the NC implements an assessment process that requires each Director to submit an assessment form of the performance of the Board as a whole during the financial year under review. This assessment process takes into account, inter alia, performance indicators such as governance, leadership and strategy, meeting and decision making, Board composition, maintenance of independence, competencies, development and training, control and risk management and communication. The Company Secretary compiles the Directors' evaluation into a consolidated report and presented it to the NC and the Board. No external facilitator was used in the evaluation process.

For FY2020, having reviewed the overall performance of the Board in terms of its role and responsibilities and the conduct of its affairs as a whole, the NC is of the view that the performance of the Board and its various committees is effective.

Evaluation of Individual director's performance

For the assessment of individual Directors, the NC considers the contribution by each Director towards the effectiveness of the Board and its committees in which he or she is a chairperson or member. The assessment includes, inter alia, attendance and quality of participation at Board and committee meetings, commitment of time, knowledge and abilities, teamwork and overall effectiveness to enable the Board and its committees to make sound and well-considered decisions.

In FY2020, the NC has reviewed each individual director's performance and is of the view that each individual Director has contributed effectively and demonstrated commitment to his/her role.

The Company does not use any external professional facilitator for the assessments of the Board, Board committees and individual Directors, and will consider the use of such facilitator as and when appropriate.

REMUNERATION MATTERS

Principle 6: Formal and transparent procedure for developing policies on director and executive remuneration

Provisions 6.1 & 6.2 Remuneration Committee

The Remuneration Committee ("RC") comprises three members, all of whom are independent.

Dr Wan Soon Bee (RC Chairman) Lee Kia Jong Elaine (Mrs Elaine Lim) Yeo Hock Chye

The main responsibilities of the RC are to

- recommend to the Board a framework of remuneration for the Board and key management personnel, review specific remuneration packages for each Executive Director and key management personnel;
- review the Directors' Fee framework;
- review the remuneration of employees who are immediate family members of a Director or the Managing Director to ensure that the remuneration of each of such employee commensurate with his or her duties and responsibilities, and no preferential treatment is given to him or her.

Provision 6.3 Review of remuneration

All aspects of remuneration, including but not limited to directors' fees, salaries, allowances, bonuses, benefits-in-kind and termination payments will be reviewed by the RC. No member of the RC or any director is involved in the deliberations in respect of any remuneration, compensation, options or any form of benefits to be granted to him.

Each of the Executive Directors and key management personnel has an employment contract with the Company which can be terminated by either party giving notice of resignation or termination. The RC has reviewed and concluded that the termination clauses are fair and reasonable.

Provision 6.4

Engagement of remuneration consultants

The RC will be provided with access to expert professional advice on remuneration matters as and when necessary. The expense of such services shall be borne by the Company. The RC shall ensure that remuneration consultants, if engaged, shall be free from any relationships with the Company which might affect their objectivity and independence. The expenses of such professional services shall be borne by the Company. For FY2020, there was no engagement of remuneration consultant.

LEVEL AND MIX OF REMUNERATION

Principle 7: Level and mix of Remuneration

Provision 7.1

Remuneration of Executive Directors and key management personnel

A significant and appropriate proportion of Executive Directors' and key management personnel's remuneration is structured such that rewards are linked to corporate and individual performance. Such performance-related remuneration is aligned with the interests of shareholders and promotes the long-term success of the Company.

The Company has no employee share incentive scheme or other long-term incentives. In this regard, the RC has reviewed and is satisfied that the existing compensation structure with variable component paid out in cash has continued to be effective in incentivising performance without being excessive.

The RC has reviewed the recommendations of the Code on the use of contractual provisions to allow the Company to reclaim incentive components of remuneration from Executive Directors and key management personnel, in exceptional circumstances, and considers it unnecessary in the current context.

There are no contractual provisions in the employment contracts of Executive Directors and key management personnel for the Company to reclaim incentive components of remuneration.

Provision 7.2

Remuneration of Non-Executive Directors

All the Non-Executive Directors have no service contract with the Company and are compensated based on a fixed annual fee taking into account factors such as responsibilities, efforts and time spent.

The RC considers that the current fixed fee structure adequately compensates the Non-Executive Directors, and given the size and operations of the Company, without implementation of shares schemes. The RC will consider recommending such schemes if appropriate.

Provision 7.3

Remuneration Framework

The remuneration framework for the Directors, CEO and key management personnel is aligned with the sustained performance of the Group and the interest of shareholders and is appropriate to attract, retain and motivate them for the long-term success of the Group.

Provision 9.1

Risk Management and Internal Controls System

The Board is responsible for the governance of risks, including determining the nature and extent of the significant risks which the company is willing to take. The Board ensures that Group's risk management framework and policies are in place. The AC is tasked with the responsibility to ensure that the Management maintains a sound system of risk management and internal controls. Having considered the Group's business operations as well as its existing internal control and risk management systems, the Board is of the view that a separate risk committee is not required for the time being.

The Group maintains a system of internal controls for all companies within the Group. The controls are to provide reasonable assurance (but not absolute guarantee) that assets are adequately safeguarded, operational and information technology controls are in place, business risks are suitably addressed and proper accounting records are maintained. The AC reviews the effectiveness of the Company's material internal controls, including financial, operational and administrative controls and risk management annually. In the course of their statutory audit, the external auditors conduct an annual review of the effectiveness of the Company's material internal controls, including financial, operational compliance and information technology controls, and risk management systems. The AC reviews the audit plans and the findings of the external auditors annually and takes steps to ensure that the company follows up on the recommendations raised by the external auditors, if any, during the audit process.

The Board reviews the effectiveness of the key internal controls with the AC annually and on an on-going basis and provides its perspective on management control and ensures that the necessary corrective and preventive actions are taken on a timely basis.

For FY2020, the Board has reviewed with the AC the following significant risk factors relevant to the Group's operations:

- Interest rate risk
- Equity price risk
- Credit risk
- Liquidity risk
- Capital risk

The above risks and the management of these risks are set out on pages 58 to 64 of this annual report.

Provision 9.2

Assurances to the Board

For FY2020, the Board has received letters of assurance from the CEO and CFO of the Company that the financial records have been properly maintained and the financial statements give a true and fair view of the Group's operations and finances. It has also received assurance from the CEO and other key management personnel who are responsible, regarding the adequacy and effectiveness of the company's risk management and internal control systems.

Board's Comment on Adequacy and Effectiveness of Internal Controls

All AC members have recent and relevant accounting or related financial management expertise or experience to discharge their responsibilities effectively.

The Chairman of the AC, Mr Yeo Hock Chye has considerable years of experience in the financial services industry, banking and risk consultancy. The other AC members, Dr Wan Soon Bee and Ms Lee Kia Jong Elaine (Mrs Elaine Lim) carry with them considerable experience in business and finance.

During FY2020, each of the AC members attended various external training ranging from changes in accounting standards, risk management, corporate governance and regulatory related topics. Besides the external training, the AC has kept abreast of changes in accounting standards and issues which impact the financial statements from briefings from external auditors during the AC meetings.

The qualifications of the AC members are found on profiles of the Directors in page 21 to 25 of this Annual Report.

Roles, responsibilities and authorities of AC

The AC assists the Board in fulfilling its fiduciary responsibilities. The main responsibilities of the AC include:

- review the significant financial reporting issues and judgements to ensure the integrity of the financial statements and any announcement relating to financial performance;
- review and evaluate with internal auditors, the adequacy and effectiveness of internal controls, including financial, operational, compliance and information technology controls and risk management systems;
- review the scope and effectiveness of internal audit;
- reviewing the assurance from the CEO and the CFO on the financial records and financial statements
 and the assurances from the CEO and the management personnel responsible on the adequacy and
 effectiveness of internal controls and risk management systems.
- review the scope and results of the external audit, including management's response to the auditors' recommendations for improvements to the Group's internal controls, if any;
- review the independence and objectivity of the external auditors;
- make recommendations on the appointment, re-appointment and removal of external auditors;
- review interested persons transactions; if any to ensure compliance with the Listing Manual;
- · review whistle blowing and investigations, if any and ensure appropriate follow up action, if require

The AC has full authority to investigate any matters within its terms of reference, full access to and co-operation by management and full discretion to invite any Director or management to attend its meetings and has been given reasonable resources to enable it to discharge its functions.

Review objectivity and independence of external auditors

The external auditors, Deloitte & Touche LLP is registered with the Accounting and Corporate Regulatory Authority. They are also the external auditors of all the Company's subsidiaries as well as its associate companies. The Company confirmed its compliance with Rule 712 and 715 of the Listing Manual.

The aggregate fees paid to the Group's external auditor, Deloitte & Touche LLP, for FY2020 was \$\$98,000, of which audit fee amounted to \$\$74,000 and non-audit fee amounted to \$\$24,000 or 32% of total audit fees. The AC has reviewed the amount, nature and extent of such non-audit services rendered to the Group by Deloitte & Touche LLP and concluded that it will not prejudice the independence and objectivity of the external auditors.

According, the AC has recommended Deloitte & Touche LLP for re-appointment as external auditors of the Company at the forthcoming annual general meeting of the Company.

Whistle-blowing policy

The Company has in place a whistle-blowing policy that provides staff of the Group direct access to the Board Chairman and/or AC Chairman to raise concerns about possible improprieties in matters of financial reporting or other matters. All information received will be treated confidentially and the identities and the interests of the whistle-blowers will be protected, so as to enable staff to voice their concerns without any fear of reprisal, retaliation, discrimination or harassment of any kind.

All whistler-blower complaints will be investigated independently by the AC and the findings will be reported to the Board.

Provision 10.3 Restriction on AC membership

None of the AC members is a former partner of the Company's existing external auditors, Deloitte & Touche LLP.

Provision 10.4 Internal audit function

The Company's internal auditors, Crowe Horwath First Trust Risk Advisory Pte Ltd is a member of the Institute of Internal Auditors Singapore, and staffed with professionals with relevant qualifications and experience. The internal auditors carry out its functions according to the standards of the Professional Practice of Internal Auditing set by The Institute of Internal Auditors, and plans its internal audit schedule in consultation with, but independent of, Management. Its internal audit plan is submitted to the AC for approval at the beginning of each internal audit cycle. The internal auditors report directly to the Chairman of the AC on all internal audit matters.

The primary functions of internal audit are to: -

- (a) assess if adequate systems of internal controls are in place to protect the assets of the Group and to ensure whether control procedures are complied with;
- assess if operations of the business processes under review are conducted efficiently and effectively;
 and
- (c) identify and recommend improvement to internal control procedures, where required.

The internal auditors completed its internal audit review for the Group in FY2020 in accordance with the internal audit plan approved by the AC. The internal auditors had unfettered access to the relevant documents, records, properties and personnel of the Group. The findings and recommendations of the internal auditors, the management's responses, and the management's implementation of the recommendations have been reviewed and approved by the AC. The AC is of the view that the internal audit function is independent, effective and adequately resourced.

Provision 10.5

Meeting with internal and external auditors without presence of management

In FY2020, the AC met with the external auditors and the internal auditor without the presence of management.

The AC had discussed the key audit matters identified by the external auditors for FY2020. The AC having reviewed the approach and methodology used, concurred with the basis and conclusion included in the auditor's report with respect to the key audit matters for FY2020.

Please refer to the Independent Auditor's Report on pages 30 to 32 of this annual report on the key audit matters.

SHAREHOLDER RIGHTS AND ENGAGEMENT

Principle 11: Shareholders to be treated fairly and equitably

Provision 11.1

Shareholders' participation and vote at general meetings

Every shareholder has the right to receive notice of general meetings and to vote thereat. Notice of a general meeting is sent out at least 14 days before the meeting so that sufficient notice is given to shareholders to attend the meeting or appoint proxies to attend and vote in their stead.

All resolutions at general meetings are required to be voted by poll under the Listing Rules of the SGX-ST. At each general meeting, shareholders will be briefed by the Company on the poll voting procedures at general meetings. Detailed results showing the number of votes cast for and against each resolution and the respective percentages will be announced during the general meetings and subsequent announcement made through SGXNET.

Provision 11.2

Separate resolutions at general meetings

The Company will have separate resolutions at general meetings on each distinct issue.

Provision 11.3

Attendance of Directors and auditors at general meetings

The Directors, in particular, Chairman of the Board and the respective Board committee Chairmen are present at general meetings to answer shareholders' queries. The external auditors are also present at the annual general meeting to answer shareholders' queries about the conduct of the audit and the preparation and content of the auditors' report.

At the last annual general meeting held on 28 June 2019, it was attended by all the Directors then.

Provision 11.4 Absentia voting

The Company's constitution allows the appointment of proxies for a shareholder who is absent from a general meeting to exercise his vote in absence through his proxy or proxies. The Company's constitution allows the appointment of up to 2 proxies for a member, who is a not a relevant intermediary as defined in Section 181 of the Companies Act, Chapter 50. The Companies Act allows relevant intermediaries such as the CPF agent bank nominees to appoint multiple proxies, and empower CPF investors to attend and vote at general meetings of the Company as their CPF agent banks' proxies.

Provision 11.5

Minutes of general meetings

The Company prepares minutes of general meetings detailing the proceedings and questions raised by shareholders and answers given by the Board and Management. The minutes will be taken and published in the Company's corporate website at www.cil.sg.

Provision 11.6 Dividend Policy

The Company has not formalised a dividend policy, however, it has been paying dividends since FY2006. The Board takes into consideration the Group's operating performance, cash position and planned capital expenditures in its recommendation of dividends.

For FY2020, the Board has recommended a first and final one-tier dividend of 1.5 cents per share subject to shareholders approval at the annual general meeting on 14 August 2020.

Provision 12.1

The Company's investor relations policy is to communicate with its shareholders and the investment community through the timely and equal dissemination of information and news via announcements to the SGX-ST via SGXNET. In accordance with the Listing Rules of the SGX-ST, information that affects the Group is disclosed in a timely manner through SGXNET and the Company does not practise selective disclosure.

The Company strives to reach out to shareholders and investors via its online investor relations site within its corporate website at www.cil.sg where it updates shareholders and investors on the latest news and business developments of the Group. Shareholders and investors are also provided with an investor relations contact at investorrelations@cil.sg, which they can send their queries and the Company will respond.

The Company has posted the contact of the Lead Independent Director on its corporate website to facilitate shareholders and other stakeholders who wish to communicate with the Lead Independent Director.

Principle 13: Balance the needs and interests of material stakeholders

Provisions 13.1 and 13.2 Engage with its material stakeholder groups

The Group's material stakeholders are its Management, shareholders, customers, suppliers and employees. The Company's focus is on the supply of its products to customers in a safe, sustainable and efficient manner.

The Company engages with the stakeholders through its sustainability initiatives as set out in its Sustainability Report for FY2019 posted on SGXNET on 12 June 2019. The Company will post its Sustainability Report for FY2020 by end of August 2020.

Provision 13.3

The website provides, inter alia, corporate announcements and profiles of the Group. Shareholders and stakeholders are provided with an investor relations contact at investorrelations@cil.sg to contact the Company.

DEALINGS IN SECURITIES

The Company has in place a policy prohibiting dealings in the Company's securities by the Company, its Directors and officers of the Company for the period of one month before the announcement of the Company's half year and full year financial statements and ending on the date of the announcement. The Directors and officers of the Company are also prohibited from dealing in the Company's securities on short-term considerations. In addition, the Company, its Directors and officers are expected to observe the insider trading laws at all times even when dealing in the Company's securities within permitted trading period.

INTERESTED PERSON TRANSACTIONS

There were no interested person transactions exceeding \$\$100,000 during the year.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Chemical Industries (Far East) Limited. (the "company") and its subsidiaries (the "group"), which comprise the consolidated statement of financial position of the group and the statement of financial position of the company as at 31 March 2020, and the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, consolidated statement of changes in equity and consolidated statement of cash flows of the group and the statement of changes in equity of the company for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, as set out on pages 33 to 82.

In our opinion, the accompanying consolidated financial statements of the group and the statement of financial position and statement of changes in equity of the company are properly drawn up in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act, Chapter 50 (the "Act") and Singapore Financial Reporting Standards (International) ("SFRS(I)s") so as to give a true and fair view of the consolidated financial position of the group and the financial position of the company as at 31 March 2020 and of the consolidated financial performance, consolidated changes in equity and consolidated cash flows of the group and of changes in equity of the company for the year ended on that date.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Singapore Standards on Auditing ("SSAs"). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the group in accordance with the Accounting and Corporate Regulatory Authority Code of Professional Conduct and Ethics for Public Accountants and Accounting Entities ("ACRA Code") together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Singapore, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the ACRA Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Key Audit Matter

Key audit matter is the matter that, in our professional judgement, was of most significance in our audit of the financial statements of the current year. This matter was addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on this matter.

Valuation of investment properties

The group has investment properties stated at fair value, determined based on professional external valuers engaged by the group, which amounted to \$54.5 million and accounted for 39% of group's total assets as at 31 March 2020.

The valuation process involves significant judgement and estimation. The valuations are dependent on the valuation methodology applied and these are underpinned by a number of assumptions which included price per square feet of market comparables used; location and remaining lease tenure. A change in the key assumptions applied may have a significant impact to the valuation.

Our audit performed and responses thereon

We considered the objectivity, independence, qualification and competency of the external valuer engaged by the group.

We considered the appropriateness of the valuation techniques used by the external valuer for the respective investment properties, taking into account the profile and type of the investment properties. We discussed with the external valuer on the results of the work, and compared the key assumptions used in their valuations by reference to externally published benchmarks where available and considered whether these assumptions are consistent with the current market environment.

We also considered the adequacy of the disclosures in the financial statements, in describing the inherent degree of subjectivity and key assumptions in the estimates.

We found that the external valuer was recognised professionals with appropriate level of qualifications and experience. The valuation methodology adopted was in line with generally accepted market practices. The key assumptions used were within reasonable range, taking into account available industry data for comparable markets and properties. We also found the related disclosures in the financial statements to be adequate.

Disclosures on key assumptions and valuation techniques of investment properties are found in Notes 3(c) and 11 to the financial statements.

Information Other than the Financial Statements and Auditor's Report Thereon

Management is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the annual report but does not include the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of Management and Directors for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with the provisions of the Act and SFRS(I)s, and for devising and maintaining a system of internal accounting controls sufficient to provide a reasonable assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorised use or disposition; and transactions are properly authorised and that they are recorded as necessary to permit the preparation of true and fair financial statements and to maintain accountability of assets.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the group's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the group or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

31 March 2020

1 GENERAL

The company (Registration No. 196200046K) is incorporated in Singapore with its principal place of business and registered office at 3, Jalan Samulun, Singapore 629127. The company is listed on the mainboard of the Singapore Exchange Securities Trading Limited. The financial statements are expressed in Singapore dollars.

The principal activities of the company are investment holding and the manufacture and sale of chemicals.

The principal activities of the subsidiaries and associates are disclosed in Notes 12 and 13 to the financial statements respectively.

The consolidated financial statements of the group and the statement of financial position and statement of changes in equity of the company for the year ended 31 March 2020 were authorised for issue by the Board of Directors on July 20, 2020.

2 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING - The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the historical cost basis except as disclosed in the accounting policies below, and are drawn up in accordance with the provisions of the Singapore Companies Act and Singapore Financial Reporting Standards (International) ("SFRS(I)s").

Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for goods and services.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date, regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using another valuation technique. In estimating the fair value of an asset or a liability, the group takes into account the characteristics of the asset or liability which market participants would take into account when pricing the asset or liability at the measurement date. Fair value for measurement and/or disclosure purposes in these consolidated financial statements is determined on such a basis, except for share-based payment transactions that are within the scope of SFRS(I) 2 *Share-based Payment*, leasing transactions that are within the scope of SFRS(I) 1-17 *Leases*, and measurements that have some similarities to fair value but are not fair value, such as net realisable value in SFRS(I) 1-2 *Inventories* or value in use in SFRS(I) 1-36 *Impairment of Assets*.

In addition, for financial reporting purposes, fair value measurements are categorised into Level 1, 2 or 3 based on the degree to which the inputs to the fair value measurements are observable and the significance of the inputs to the fair value measurement in its entirety, which are described as follows:

- Level 1 inputs are quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the entity can access at the measurement date;
- Level 2 inputs are inputs, other than quoted prices included within Level 1, that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly; and
- Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability.

Adoption of new and revised standards

On 1 April 2019, the group and the company adopted all the new and revised SFRS(I) pronouncements that are relevant to its operations. The adoption of these new/revised SFRS(I) pronouncements does not result in changes to the group's and the company's accounting policies and has no material effect on the amounts reported for the current or prior years, except as discussed below.

SFRS(I) 16 Leases

SFRS(I) 16 introduces new or amended requirements with respect to lease accounting. It introduces significant changes to lessee accounting by removing the distinction between operating and finance lease and requiring the recognition of a right-of-use asset and a lease liability at commencement for all leases, with exceptions for short-term leases and leases of low value assets. In contrast to lessee accounting, the requirements for lessor accounting have remained largely unchanged. The impact of the adoption of SFRS(I) 16 on the group's consolidated financial statements is described below.

The date of initial application of SFRS(I) 16 for the group is 1 April 2019.

The group has applied SFRS(I) 16 using the cumulative catch-up approach which:

- requires the group to recognise the cumulative effect of initially applying SFRS(I) 16 at the date of initial application; and
- does not permit restatement of comparatives, which continue to be presented under SFRS(I) 1-17
 Leases and SFRS(I) INT 4 Determining whether an Arrangement contains a Lease.

(a) Impact of the new definition of a lease

The group has made use of the practical expedient available on transition to SFRS(I) 16 not to reassess whether a contract is or contains a lease. Accordingly, the definition of a lease in accordance with SFRS(I) 1-17 and SFRS(I) INT 4 will continue to be applied to those leases entered or changed before 1 April 2019.

The change in definition of a lease mainly relates to the concept of control. SFRS(I) 16 determines whether a contract contains a lease on the basis of whether the customer has the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration. This is in contrast to the focus on 'risks and rewards' in SFRS(I) 1-17 and SFRS(I) INT 4.

The group applies the definition of a lease and related guidance set out in SFRS(I) 16 to all lease contracts entered into or modified on or after 1 April 2019 (whether it is a lessor or a lessee in the lease contract). The new definition in SFRS(I) 16 does not significantly change the scope of contracts that meet the definition of a lease for the group.

(b) Impact on lessee accounting

Former operating leases

SFRS(I) 16 changes how the group accounts for leases previously classified as operating leases under SFRS(I) 1-17, which were off-balance-sheet.

Applying SFRS(I) 16, for all leases, the group:

- a) Recognises right-of-use assets and lease liabilities in the statements of financial position, initially measured at the present value of future lease payments, with the right-of-use asset adjusted by the amount of any prepaid or accrued lease payments in accordance with SFRS(I) 16.C8(b)(ii) except for the right-of-use asset for land leases which were measured on a retrospective basis as if the standard has been applied since the commencement date;
- b) Recognises depreciation of right-of-use assets and interest on lease liabilities in the consolidated statement of profit or loss; and
- c) Separates the total amount of cash paid into a principal portion (presented within financing activities) and interest (presented within operating activities) in the consolidated statement of cash flows.

Lease incentives (e.g. free rent period) are recognised as part of the measurement of the right-of-use assets and lease liabilities whereas under SFRS(I) 1-17 they resulted in the recognition of a lease incentive liability, amortised as a reduction of rental expense on a straight-line basis.

Under SFRS(I) 16, right-of-use assets are tested for impairment in accordance with SFRS 1-36 *Impairment of Assets*.

For short-term leases (lease term of 12 months or less) and leases of low-value assets (which includes tablets and personal computers, small items of office furniture and telephones), the group has opted to recognise a lease expense on a straight-line basis as permitted by SFRS(I) 16. This expense is presented within other expenses in the consolidated statement of profit or loss.

The group has used the following practical expedients when applying the cumulative catch-up approach to leases previously classified as operating leases applying SFRS(I) 1-17:

- The group has elected not to recognise right-of-use assets and lease liabilities to leases for which the lease term ends within 12 months of the date of initial application.
- The group has excluded initial direct costs from the measurement of the right-of-use asset at the date
 of initial application.

(b) Impact on lessee accounting (continued)

Former finance leases

For leases that were classified as finance leases applying SFRS(I) 1-17, the carrying amount of the leased assets and obligations under finance leases measured applying SFRS(I) 1-17 immediately before the date of initial application is reclassified to right-of-use assets and lease liabilities respectively without any adjustments, except in cases where the group has elected to apply the low-value lease recognition exemption.

The right-of-use asset and the lease liability are accounted for applying SFRS(I) 16 from 1 April 2019.

(c) Impact on lessor accounting

SFRS(I) 16 does not change substantially how a lessor accounts for leases. Under SFRS(I) 16, a lessor continues to classify leases as either finance leases or operating leases and account for those two types of leases differently.

However, SFRS(I) 16 has changed and expanded the disclosures required, in particular regarding how a lessor manages the risks arising from its residual interest in leased assets.

(d) Financial impact of initial application of SFRS(I) 16

The weighted average lessee's incremental borrowing rate applied to the lease liabilities recognised in the statement of financial position on 1 April 2019 is 2.76% per annum.

The following table shows the operating lease commitments disclosed applying SFRS(I) 1-17 at 31 March 2019, discounted using the incremental borrowing rate at the date of initial application and the lease liabilities recognised in the statement of financial position at the date of initial application.

Right-of-use assets were measured at the amount equal to the lease liabilities, adjusted by the amount of any prepaid or accrued lease payments relating to that lease recognised in the statement of financial position immediately before the date of initial application, except for the right-of-use assets for land leases measured on a retrospective basis as if the Standard had been applied since the commencement date. Consequently, right-of-use assets of \$7.18 million was recognised on 1 April 2019 and prepaid land use of \$1.9 million was reclassified to right-of-use assets.

BASIS OF CONSOLIDATION - The consolidated financial statements incorporate the financial statements of the company and entities controlled by the company and its subsidiaries. Control is achieved when the company:

- Has power over the investee;
- Is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee; and
- Has the ability to use its power to affect its returns.

The company reassesses whether or not it controls an investee if facts and circumstances indicate that there are changes to one or more of the three elements of control listed above.

When the company has less than a majority of the voting rights of an investee, it has power over the investee when the voting rights are sufficient to give it the practical ability to direct the relevant activities of the investee unilaterally. The company considers all relevant facts and circumstances in assessing whether or not the company's voting rights in an investee are sufficient to give it power, including:

- The size of the company's holding of voting rights relative to the size and dispersion of holdings of the other vote holders;
- Potential voting rights held by the company, other vote holders or other parties;
- Rights arising from other contractual arrangements; and
- Any additional facts and circumstances that indicate that the company has, or does not have, the
 current ability to direct the relevant activities at the time that decisions need to be made, including
 voting patterns at previous shareholders' meetings.

Consolidation of a subsidiary begins when the company obtains control over the subsidiary and ceases when the company loses control of the subsidiary. Specifically, income and expenses of a subsidiary acquired or disposed of during the year are included in the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income from the date the company gains control until the date when the company ceases to control the subsidiary.

Changes in the group's ownership interests in existing subsidiaries

Changes in the group's ownership interests in a subsidiary that do not result in the group losing control over the subsidiary are accounted for as equity transactions. The carrying amounts of the group's interests and the non-controlling interests are adjusted to reflect the changes in their relative interests in the subsidiary. Any difference between the amount by which the non-controlling interests are adjusted and the fair value of the consideration paid or received is recognised directly in equity and attributed to owners of the company.

When the group loses control of a subsidiary, a gain or loss is recognised in profit or loss and is calculated as the difference between (i) the aggregate of the fair value of the consideration received and the fair value of any retained interest and (ii) the previous carrying amount of the assets (including goodwill), and liabilities of the subsidiary and any non-controlling interests. All amounts previously recognised in other comprehensive income in relation to that subsidiary are accounted for as if the group had directly disposed of the related assets or liabilities of the subsidiary (i.e. reclassified to profit or loss or transferred to another category of equity as specified/permitted by applicable SFRS(I)s). The fair value of any investment retained in the former subsidiary at the date when control is lost is regarded as the fair value on initial recognition for subsequent accounting under SFRS(I) 9, when applicable, the cost on initial recognition of an investment in an associate or a joint venture.

In the company's financial statements, investment in subsidiary is carried at cost less any impairment in net recoverable value that has been recognised in profit or loss.

FINANCIAL INSTRUMENT - Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised on the group's statement of financial position when the group becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition. Transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets or financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Financial assets

All financial assets are recognised and de-recognised on a trade date basis where the purchase or sale of financial assets is under a contract whose terms require delivery of assets within the time frame established by the market concerned.

All recognised financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets.

Classification of financial assets

Debt instruments that meet the following conditions are subsequently measured at amortised cost:

- the financial asset is held within a business model whose objective is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows; and
- the contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely
 payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Amortised cost and effective interest method

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a debt instrument and of allocating interest income over the relevant period.

The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) excluding expected credit losses, through the expected life of the debt instrument, or, where appropriate, a shorter period, to the gross carrying amount of the debt instrument on initial recognition.

The amortised cost of a financial asset is the amount at which the financial asset is measured at initial recognition minus the principal repayments, plus the cumulative amortisation using the effective interest method of any difference between that initial amount and the maturity amount, adjusted for any loss allowance. On the other hand, the gross carrying amount of a financial asset is the amortised cost of a financial asset before adjusting for any loss allowance.

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method for debt instruments measured subsequently at amortised cost. Interest income is calculated by applying the effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount of a financial asset, except for financial assets that have subsequently become credit-impaired. For financial assets that have subsequently become credit-impaired, interest income is recognised by applying the effective interest rate to the amortised cost of the financial asset. If, in subsequent reporting periods, the credit risk on the credit-impaired financial instrument improves so that the financial asset is no longer credit-impaired, interest income is recognised by applying the effective interest rate to the gross carrying amount of the financial asset.

Interest income is recognised in profit or loss and is included in the "interest income" line item.

Financial assets at FVTPL

Financial assets that do not meet the criteria for being measured at amortised cost or FVTOCI are measured at FVTPL.

Financial assets at FVTPL are measured at fair value as at each reporting date, with any fair value gains or losses recognised in profit or loss to the extent they are not part of a designated hedging relationship. The net gain or loss recognised in profit or loss includes any dividend or interest earned on the financial asset and is included in the "other income (expense)" line item (Note 23). Fair value is determined in the manner described in Note 4(c)(vii).

Foreign exchange gains and losses

The carrying amount of financial assets that are denominated in a foreign currency is determined in that foreign currency and translated at the spot rate as at each reporting date. Specifically,

- for financial assets measured at amortised cost that are not part of a designated hedging relationship, exchange differences are recognised in profit or loss in the "other income (expense)" line item; and
- for financial assets measured at FVTPL that are not part of a designated hedging relationship, exchange differences are recognised in profit or loss in the "other income (expense)" line item.

Impairment of financial assets

The group recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses ("ECL") on investments in debt instruments that are measured at amortised cost. No impairment loss is recognised for investments in equity instruments. The amount of expected credit losses is updated at each reporting date to reflect changes in credit risk since initial recognition of the respective financial instrument.

The group always recognises lifetime ECL for trade receivables. The expected credit losses on these financial assets are estimated using a provision matrix based on the group's historical credit loss experience, adjusted for factors that are specific to the debtors, general economic conditions and an assessment of both the current as well as the forecast direction of conditions at the reporting date, including time value of money where appropriate.

For all other financial instruments, the group recognises lifetime ECL when there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition. If, on the other hand, the credit risk on the financial instrument has not increased significantly since initial recognition, the group measures the loss allowance for that financial instrument at an amount equal to 12-month ECL. The assessment of whether lifetime ECL should be recognised is based on significant increases in the likelihood or risk of a default occurring since initial recognition instead of on evidence of a financial asset being credit-impaired at the reporting date or an actual default occurring.

Lifetime ECL represents the expected credit losses that will result from all possible default events over the expected life of a financial instrument. In contrast, 12-month ECL represents the portion of lifetime ECL that is expected to result from default events on a financial instrument that are possible within 12 months after the reporting date.

Significant increase in credit risk

In assessing whether the credit risk on a financial instrument has increased significantly since initial recognition, the group compares the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument as at the reporting date with the risk of a default occurring on the financial instrument as at the date of initial recognition. In making this assessment, the group considers both quantitative and qualitative information that is reasonable and supportable, including historical experience and forward-looking information that is available without undue cost or effort. Forward-looking information considered includes the future prospects of the industries in which the group's debtors operate, obtained from economic expert reports, financial analysts, governmental bodies, relevant think-tanks and other similar organisations, as well as consideration of various external sources of actual and forecast economic information that relate to the group's core operations, namely the Industrial Chemicals and Property Operations.

In particular, the following information is taken into account when assessing whether credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition:

- existing or forecast adverse changes in business, financial or economic conditions that are expected
 to cause a significant decrease in the debtor's ability to meet its debt obligations;
- an actual or expected significant deterioration in the operating results of the debtor;
- significant increases in credit risk on other financial instruments of the same debtor; and
- an actual or expected significant adverse change in the regulatory, economic, or technological
 environment of the debtor that results in a significant decrease in the debtor's ability to meet its debt
 obligations.

Irrespective of the outcome of the above assessment, the group presumes that the credit risk on a financial asset has increased significantly since initial recognition when contractual payments are more than 30 days past due, unless the group has reasonable and supportable information that demonstrates otherwise.

Despite the aforegoing, the group assumes that the credit risk on a financial instrument has not increased significantly since initial recognition if the financial instrument is determined to have low credit risk at the reporting date. A financial instrument is determined to have low credit risk if i) the financial instrument has a low risk of default, ii) the borrower has a strong capacity to meet its contractual cash flow obligations in the near term and iii) adverse changes in economic and business conditions in the longer term may, but will not necessarily, reduce the ability of the borrower to fulfil its contractual cash flow obligations.

The group regularly monitors the effectiveness of the criteria used to identify whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk and revises them as appropriate to ensure that the criteria are capable of identifying significant increase in credit risk before the amount becomes past due.

Definition of default

The group considers the following as constituting an event of default for internal credit risk management purposes as historical experience indicates that receivables that meet either of the following criteria are generally not recoverable.

- when there is a breach of financial covenants by the counterparty; or
- information developed internally or obtained from external sources indicates that the debtor is unlikely
 to pay its creditors, including the group, in full (without taking into account any collaterals held by
 the group).

Irrespective of the above analysis, the group considers that default has occurred when a financial asset is more than 90 days past due unless the group has reasonable and supportable information to demonstrate that a more lagging default criterion is more appropriate.

Credit-impaired financial assets

A financial asset is credit-impaired when one or more events that have a detrimental impact on the estimated future cash flows of that financial asset have occurred. Evidence that a financial asset is credit-impaired includes observable data about the following events:

- a) significant financial difficulty of the issuer or the borrower; or
- b) a breach of contract, such as a default or past due event; or
- c) the lender(s) of the borrower, for economic or contractual reasons relating to the borrower's financial difficulty, having granted to the borrower a concession(s) that the lender(s) would not otherwise consider; or
- $d) \ \ it is becoming probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; or$
- e) the disappearance of an active market for that financial asset because of financial difficulties.

Write-off policy

The group writes off a financial asset when there is information indicating that the counterparty is in severe financial difficulty and there is no realistic prospect of recovery, e.g. when the counterparty has been placed under liquidation or has entered into bankruptcy proceedings, or in the case of trade receivables, when the amounts are over two years past due, whichever occurs sooner. Financial assets written off may still be subject to enforcement activities under the group's recovery procedures, taking into account legal advice where appropriate. Any recoveries made are recognised in profit or loss.

Measurement and recognition of expected credit losses

The measurement of expected credit losses is a function of the probability of default, loss given default (i.e. the magnitude of the loss if there is a default) and the exposure at default. The assessment of the probability of default and loss given default is based on historical data adjusted by forward-looking information as described above. As for the exposure at default, for financial assets, this is represented by the assets' gross carrying amount at the reporting date; for loan commitments and financial guarantee contracts, the exposure includes the amount drawn down as at the reporting date, together with any additional amounts expected to be drawn down in the future by default date determined based on historical trend, the group's understanding of the specific future financing needs of the debtors, and other relevant forward-looking information.

For financial assets, the expected credit loss is estimated as the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due to the group in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the group expects to receive, discounted at the original effective interest rate. For a lease receivable, the cash flows used for determining the expected credit losses is consistent with the cash flows used in measuring the lease receivable in accordance with SFRS(I) 1-17 *Leases*.

Derecognition of financial assets

The group derecognises a financial asset only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or when it transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another party. If the group neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership and continues to control the transferred asset, the group recognises its retained interest in the asset and an associated liability for amounts it may have to pay. If the group retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of a transferred financial asset, the group continues to recognise the financial asset and also recognises a collateralised borrowing for the proceeds received.

On derecognition of a financial asset measured at amortised cost, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable is recognised in profit or loss.

Financial liabilities and equity instruments

Classification as debt or equity

Debt and equity instruments issued by a group entity are classified as either financial liabilities or as equity in accordance with the substance of the contractual arrangements and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

Equity instruments

An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of an entity after deducting all of its liabilities. Equity instruments issued by a group entity are recognised at the proceeds received, net of direct issue costs.

Repurchase of the company's own equity instruments is recognised and deducted directly in equity. No gain or loss is recognised in profit or loss on the purchase, sale, issue or cancellation of the company's own equity instruments.

Financial liabilities

All financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method or at FVTPL.

Financial liabilities subsequently measured at amortised cost

Financial liabilities that are not 1) contingent consideration of an acquirer in a business combination, 2) held-for-trading, or 3) designated as at FVTPL, are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial liability, or (where appropriate) a shorter period, to the amortised cost of a financial liability.

Foreign exchange gains and losses

For financial liabilities that are denominated in a foreign currency and are measured at amortised cost as at each reporting date, the foreign exchange gains and losses are determined based on the amortised cost of the instruments. These foreign exchange gains and losses are recognised in the "other income (expense)" line item in profit or loss (Note 23) for financial liabilities.

The fair value of financial liabilities denominated in a foreign currency is determined in that foreign currency and translated at the spot rate at the end of the reporting period. For financial liabilities that are measured as at FVTPL, the foreign exchange component forms part of the fair value gains or losses and is recognised in profit or loss for financial liabilities that are not part of a designated hedging relationship.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

The group derecognises financial liabilities when, and only when, the group's obligations are discharged, cancelled or they expire. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable, including any non-cash assets transferred or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

Offsetting arrangements

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount presented in the statement of financial position when the company and the group has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts; and intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously. A right to set-off must be available today rather than being contingent on a future event and must be exercisable by any of the counterparties, both in the normal course of business and in the event of default, insolvency or bankruptcy.

INVENTORIES - Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost comprises direct materials and, where applicable, direct labour costs and those overheads that have been incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. Cost is calculated using the weighted average method. Net realisable value represents the estimated selling price less all estimated costs of completion and costs to be incurred in marketing, selling and distribution.

PROPERTY, PLANT AND EQUIPMENT - Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Properties in the course of construction for production, supply or administrative purposes, or for purposes not yet determined, are carried at cost, less any recognised impairment loss. Cost includes professional fees and other costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management. Depreciation of these assets, on the same basis as other properties assets, commences when the assets are available for their intended use.

Depreciation is charged so as to write off the cost of assets, other than assets under construction, over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method, on the following bases:

Plant and machinery and laboratory equipment
Steel cylinders
Office equipment, furniture and fittings
Motor vehicles

The estimated useful lives, residual values and depreciation method are reviewed at the end of each annual reporting period, with the effect of any changes in estimate accounted for on a prospective basis.

Fully depreciated assets still in use are retained in the financial statements.

The gain or loss arising on disposal or retirement of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined as the difference between the sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in profit or loss.

Assets held under finance leases are depreciated over their expected useful lives on the same basis as owned assets or, if there is no certainty that the lessee will obtain ownership by the end of the lease term, the asset shall be fully depreciated over the shorter of the lease term and its useful life.

PREPAID LAND LEASE - Prepaid land lease is stated at cost less accumulated amortisation. Amortisation is charged over the duration of the land lease using the straight-line method at 2.2% per annum.

INVESTMENT PROPERTY - Investment property, which is property held to earn rentals and/or for capital appreciation is measured initially at its cost, including transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, investment property is measured at fair value. Gains or losses arising from changes in the fair value of investment property are included in profit or loss for the period in which they arise.

An investment property is derecognised upon disposal or when the investment property is permanently withdrawn from use and no further economic benefits are expected from the disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the property (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in profit or loss in the period in which the property is derecognised.

IMPAIRMENT OF NON-FINANCIAL ASSETS - At the end of each reporting period, the group reviews the carrying amounts of its non-financial assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any). Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the group estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted.

If the recoverable amount of an asset (or cash-generating unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (cash-generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (cash-generating unit) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (cash-generating unit) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

ASSOCIATES - An associate is an entity over which the group has significant influence. Significant influence is the power to participate in the financial and operating policy decisions of the investee but is not control or joint control over those policies.

The results and assets and liabilities of associates are incorporated in these consolidated financial statements using the equity method of accounting, except when the investment, or a portion thereof, is classified as held for sale, in which case it is accounted for in accordance with SFRS (I) 5 Non-current Assets Held for Sale and Discontinued Operations.

Under the equity method, an investment in an associate is initially recognised in the consolidated statement of financial position at cost and adjusted thereafter to recognise the group's share of the profit or loss and other comprehensive income of the associate. When the group's share of losses of an associate

exceeds the group's interest in that associate (which includes any long-term interests that, in substance, form part of the group's net investment in the associate), the group discontinues recognising its share of further losses. Additional losses are recognised only to the extent that the group has incurred legal or constructive obligations or made payments on behalf of the associate.

An investment in an associate is accounted for using the equity method from the date on which the investee becomes an associate. On acquisition of the investment in an associate, any excess of the cost of the investment over the group's share of the net fair value of the identifiable assets and liabilities of the investee is recognised as goodwill, which is included within the carrying amount of the investment. Any excess of the group's share of the net fair value of the identifiable assets and liabilities over the cost of the investment, after reassessment, is recognised immediately in profit or loss in the period in which the investment is acquired.

The requirements of SFRS(I) 9 are applied to determine whether it is necessary to recognise any impairment loss with respect to the group's investment in an associate. When necessary, the entire carrying amount of the investment (including goodwill) is tested for impairment in accordance with SFRS(I) 1-36 *Impairment of Assets* as a single asset by comparing its recoverable amount (higher of value in use and fair value less costs to sell) with its carrying amount, any impairment loss recognised forms part of the carrying amount of the investment. Any reversal of that impairment loss is recognised in accordance with SFRS(I) 1-36 to the extent that the recoverable amount of the investment subsequently increases.

The group discontinues the use of the equity method from the date when the investment ceases to be an associate, or when the investment is classified as held for sale. When the group retains an interest in the former associate and the retained interest is a financial asset, the group measures the retained interest at fair value at that date and the fair value is regarded as its fair value on initial recognition in accordance with SFRS(I) 9. The difference between the carrying amount of the associate at the date the equity method was discontinued, and the fair value of any retained interest and any proceeds from disposing of a part interest in the associate is included in the determination of the gain or loss on disposal of the associate. In addition, the group accounts for all amounts previously recognised in other comprehensive income in relation to that associate on the same basis as would be required if that associate had directly disposed of the related assets or liabilities. Therefore, if a gain or loss previously recognised in other comprehensive income by that associate would be reclassified to profit or loss on the disposal of the related assets or liabilities, the group reclassifies the gain or loss from equity to profit or loss (as a reclassification adjustment) when the equity method is discontinued.

When the group reduces its ownership interest in an associate but the group continues to use the equity method, the group reclassifies to profit or loss the proportion of the gain or loss that had previously been recognised in other comprehensive income relating to that reduction in ownership interest if that gain or loss would be reclassified to profit or loss on the disposal of the related assets or liabilities.

When a group entity transacts with an associate of the group, profits and losses resulting from the transactions with the associate are recognised in the group's consolidated financial statements only to the extent of interests in the associate that are not related to the group.

PROVISIONS - Provisions are recognised when the group has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the group will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. Where a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present obligation, its carrying amount is the present value of those cash flows.

When some or all of the economic benefits required to settle a provision are expected to be recovered from a third party, the receivable is recognised as an asset if it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Leases (before 1 April 2019)

Leases are classified as finance leases whenever the terms of the lease transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to the lessee. All other leases are classified as operating leases.

The group as lessor

Rental income from operating leases is recognised on a straight-line basis over the term of the relevant lease unless another systematic basis is more representative of the time pattern in which use benefit derived from the leased asset is diminished. Initial direct costs incurred in negotiating and arranging an operating lease are added to the carrying amount of the leased asset and recognised as an expense over the lease term on the same basis as lease income.

The group as lessee

Assets held under finance leases are recognised as assets of the group at their fair value at the inception of the lease or, if lower, at the present value of the minimum lease payments. The corresponding liability to the lessor is included in the statement of financial position as a finance lease obligation. Lease payments are apportioned between finance charges and reduction of the lease obligation so as to achieve a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability. Finance charges are charged directly to profit or loss.

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the term of the relevant lease unless another systematic basis is more representative of the time pattern in which economic benefits from the leased asset are consumed.

Leases (From 1 April 2019)

The group as lessee

The group assesses whether a contract is or contains a lease, at inception of the contract. The group recognises a right-of-use asset and a corresponding lease liability with respect to all lease arrangements in which it is the lessee, except for short-term leases (defined as leases with a lease term of 12 months or less) and leases of low value assets. For these leases, the group recognises the lease payments as an operating expense on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease unless another systematic basis is more representative of the time pattern in which economic benefits from the leased assets are consumed.

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date, discounted by using the rate implicit in the lease. If this rate cannot be readily determined, the group uses the incremental borrowing rate specific to the lessee.

Lease payments included in the measurement of the lease liability comprise:

- fixed lease payments (including in-substance fixed payments), less any lease incentives;
- variable lease payments that depend on an index or rate, initially measured using the index or rate
 at the commencement date;
- the amount expected to be payable by the lessee under residual value guarantees;
- the exercise price of purchase options, if the lessee is reasonably certain to exercise the options; and
- payments of penalties for terminating the lease, if the lease term reflects the exercise of an option to terminate the lease.

The lease liability is presented as a separate line in the statement of financial position.

The lease liability is subsequently measured by increasing the carrying amount to reflect interest on the lease liability (using the effective interest method) and by reducing the carrying amount to reflect the lease payments made.

The group remeasures the lease liability (and makes a corresponding adjustment to the related right-of-use asset) whenever:

• the lease term has changed or there is a significant event or change in circumstances resulting in a change in the assessment of exercise of a purchase option, in which case the lease liability is remeasured by discounting the revised lease payments using a revised discount rate;

- the lease payments change due to changes in an index or rate or a change in expected payment under
 a guaranteed residual value, in which cases the lease liability is remeasured by discounting the revised
 lease payments using the initial discount rate (unless the lease payments change is due to a change
 in a floating interest rate, in which case a revised discount rate is used); or
- a lease contract is modified and the lease modification is not accounted for as a separate lease, in
 which case the lease liability is remeasured by discounting the revised lease payments using a revised
 discount rate at the effective date of the modification.

The right-of-use assets comprise the initial measurement of the corresponding lease liability, lease payments made at or before the commencement day, less any lease incentives received and any initial direct costs. They are subsequently measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Right-of-use assets are depreciated over the shorter period of lease term and useful life of the underlying asset. If a lease transfers ownership of the underlying asset or the cost of the right-of-use asset reflects that the group expects to exercise a purchase option, the related right-of-use asset is depreciated over the useful life of the underlying asset. The depreciation starts at the commencement date of the lease.

The right-of-use assets are presented as a separate line in the statement of financial position.

The group applies SFRS(I) 1-36 to determine whether a right-of-use asset is impaired and accounts for any identified impairment loss as described in Note 2.

Variable rents that do not depend on an index or rate are not included in the measurement of the lease liability and the right-of-use asset. The related payments are recognised as an expense in the period in which the event or condition that triggers those payments occurs and are included in the line 'Cost of sales' in the statement of profit or loss.

The group as lessor

The group enters into lease agreements as a lessor with respect to its investment properties.

Leases for which the group is a lessor are classified as finance or operating leases. Whenever the terms of the lease transfer substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership to the lessee, the contract is classified as a finance lease. All other leases are classified as operating leases.

Rental income from operating leases is recognised on a straight-line basis over the term of the relevant lease. Initial direct costs incurred in negotiating and arranging an operating lease are added to the carrying amount of the leased asset and recognised on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Amounts due from lessees under finance leases are recognised as receivables at the amount of the group's net investment in the leases. Finance lease income is allocated to accounting periods so as to reflect a constant periodic rate of return on the group's net investment outstanding in respect of the leases.

When a contract includes lease and non-lease components, the group applies SFRS(I) 15 to allocate the consideration under the contract to each component.

GOVERNMENT GRANTS - Government grants are not recognised until there is reasonable assurance that the group will comply with the conditions attaching to them and the grants will be received.

Other government grants are recognised as income over the periods necessary to match them with the costs for which they are intended to compensate, on a systematic basis. Government grants that are receivable as compensation for expenses or losses already incurred or for the purpose of giving immediate financial support to the group with no future related costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they become receivable

REVENUE RECOGNITION - Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable. Revenue is reduced for estimated customer returns, rebates and other similar allowances.

Revenue is measured based on the consideration specified in a contract with a customer and excludes amounts collected on behalf of third parties. The group recognises revenue at point in time when it transfers control of a product or service to a customer.

Sale of goods

Revenue is recognised at a point in time when control of the goods has transferred, being when the goods have been shipped to the customer's specific location (delivery).

Interest income

Interest income is accrued on a time basis, by reference to the principal outstanding and at the effective interest rate applicable.

Dividend income

Dividend income from investments is recognised when the shareholders' rights to receive payment have been established.

BORROWING COSTS - Borrowing costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of qualifying assets, which are assets that necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use or sale, are added to the cost of those assets, until such time as the assets are substantially ready for their intended use or sale.

All other borrowing costs are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they are incurred.

RETIREMENT BENEFIT COSTS - Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit plans are charged as an expense when employees have rendered the services entitling them to the contributions. Payments made to state-managed retirement benefit schemes, such as the Singapore Central Provident Fund, are dealt with as payments to defined contribution plans where the group's obligations under the plans are equivalent to those arising in a defined contribution retirement benefit plan.

EMPLOYEE LEAVE ENTITLEMENT - Employee entitlements to annual leave are recognised when they accrue to employees. A provision is made for the estimated liability for annual leave as a result of services rendered by employees up to the end of the reporting period.

INCOME TAX - Income tax expense represents the sum of the tax currently payable and deferred tax.

The tax currently payable is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from profit as reported in the statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income because it excludes items of income or expense that are taxable or deductible in other years and it further excludes items that are not taxable or tax deductible. The group's liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted in countries where the company and subsidiaries operate by the end of the reporting period.

Deferred tax is recognised on differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities in the financial statements and the corresponding tax bases used in the computation of taxable profit, and is accounted for using the balance sheet liability method. Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences and deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that taxable profits will be available against which deductible temporary differences can be utilised. Such assets and liabilities are not recognised if the temporary difference arises from goodwill or from the initial recognition (other than in a business combination) of other assets and liabilities in a transaction that affects neither the taxable profit nor the accounting profit.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for taxable temporary differences arising on investments in subsidiaries and associates except where the group is able to control the reversal of the temporary difference and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax assets arising from deductible temporary differences associated with such investments and interests are only recognised to the extent that it is probable that there will be sufficient taxable profits against which to utilise the benefits of the temporary differences and they are expected to reverse in the foreseeable future.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profits will be available to allow all or part of the asset to be recovered.

Deferred tax is calculated at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the period when the liability is settled or the asset realised based on the tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period. Except for investment properties measured using the fair value model, the measurement of deferred tax liabilities and assets reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the group expects, at the end of the reporting period, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities.

For the purposes of measuring deferred tax liabilities and deferred tax assets for investment properties that are measured using the fair value model, the carrying amounts of such properties are presumed to be recovered through sale, unless the presumption is rebutted. The presumption is rebutted when the investment property is depreciable and is held within a business model of the group whose business objective is to consume substantially all of the economic benefits embodied in the investment property over time, rather than through sale. Management has not rebutted the presumption that the carrying amount of the investment properties will be recovered entirely through sale.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset when there is a legally enforceable right to set off current tax assets against current tax liabilities and when they relate to income taxes levied by the same taxation authority and the group intends to settle its current tax assets and liabilities on a net basis.

Current and deferred tax are recognised as an expense or income in profit or loss, except when they relate to items credited or debited outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or directly in equity), in which case the tax is also recognised outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, respectively), or where they arise from the initial accounting for a business combination. In the case of a business combination, the tax effect is taken into account in calculating goodwill or determining the excess of the acquirer's interest in the net fair value of the acquiree's identifiable assets, liabilities and contingent liabilities over cost.

FOREIGN CURRENCY TRANSACTIONS AND TRANSLATION - The individual financial statements of each group entity are measured and presented in the currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates (its functional currency). The consolidated financial statements of the group and the statement of financial position of the company are presented in Singapore dollars, which is the functional currency of the company, and the presentation currency for the consolidated financial statements.

In preparing the financial statements of the individual entities, transactions in currencies other than the entity's functional currency are recorded at the rates of exchange prevailing on the date of the transaction. At end of each reporting period, monetary items denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at the end of the reporting period. Non-monetary items carried at fair value that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing on the date when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated.

Exchange differences arising on the settlement of monetary items, and on retranslation of monetary items are included in profit or loss for the period. Exchange differences arising on the retranslation of non-monetary items carried at fair value are included in profit or loss for the period except for differences arising on the retranslation of non-monetary items in respect of which gains and losses are recognised in other comprehensive income. For such non-monetary items, any exchange component of that gain or loss is also recognised in other comprehensive income.

For the purpose of presenting consolidated financial statements, the assets and liabilities of the group's foreign operations (including comparatives) are expressed in Singapore dollars using exchange rates prevailing at the end of the reporting period. Income and expense items (including comparatives) are translated at the average exchange rates for the period. Exchange differences arising, if any, are recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in a separate component of equity under the header of translation reserve.

The group has applied the option to reset the cumulative foreign currency translation differences for all foreign operations to zero at the date of transition to SFRS(I) on 1 April 2017. As a result, the cumulative foreign currency translation loss was reclassified from foreign currency translation reserve to accumulated

profits as at 1 April 2017. After the date of transition, any gain or loss on disposal of any foreign operation will exclude translation differences that arose before the date of transition.

CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS IN THE CONSOLIDATED STATEMENT OF CASH FLOWS - Cash and cash equivalents in the consolidated statement of cash flows comprise cash on hand and at bank and fixed deposits less bank overdrafts and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

3 CRITICAL ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

In the application of the group's accounting policies, which are described in Note 2, management is required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

Critical judgements in applying the group's accounting policies

The following are the critical judgement, apart from those involving estimates (see below), that management has made in the process of applying the group's accounting policies and that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements.

Provision for current tax

As described in Note 2, the group's liability for current tax is calculated using tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted in countries where the company and subsidiaries operate by the end of the reporting period. The group reviews the tax provision regularly and at the end of each reporting period, taking into consideration any changes in capital allowance based on the latest tax computation submitted and agreed to by the tax authority.

Income tax payable for the group and company amounted to \$3,919,000 and \$3,703,000 respectively (2019: \$3,627,000 and \$3,424,000 respectively).

Key sources of estimation uncertainty

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period that may have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below:

a) Impairment in property, plant and equipment

The group reviews the carrying amount of its property, plant and equipment to determine whether there are any indications that these assets have suffered an impairment loss. If indicators of impairment exist, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss, if any.

For the year ended 31 March 2020 and 2019, no impairment loss on property, plant and equipment was recognised in profit or loss.

The carrying amounts of the property, plant and equipment of the group and company are disclosed in Note 9 to the financial statements.

b) Useful lives of property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are depreciated on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives as disclosed in Note 2. Management estimates useful lives of property, plant and equipment by reference to expected usage of the plant and equipment, expected repair and maintenance, and technical or commercial obsolescence arising from changes of improvements in the market. Changes in these factors could impact the useful lives and related depreciation charges.

The carrying amount of property, plant and equipment of the group and company is disclosed in Note 9 to the financial statements.

c) Fair value of investment properties

The group estimates the fair value of investment properties based on valuation performed by an independent professional valuer. The estimated market values may differ from the price at which the group's assets could be sold at a particular time, since actual selling prices are negotiated between willing buyers and sellers. Also, certain estimates such as overall market conditions require an assessment of factors not within management's control. As a result, actual results of operations and realisation of net assets may differ from the estimates set forth in these financial statements, and the difference may be significant. Information about the valuation techniques and inputs used in determining the fair value of investment properties are disclosed in Note 10 to the financial statements.

In view of the current situation arising from the pandemic, market sentiments are expected to change post the valuation performed as at 31 March 2020.

The carrying amount of investment properties is disclosed in Note 11 to the financial statements.

d) Allowance for inventories

The policy for allowance for inventories for the group is based on management's judgement and evaluation of the saleability and the aging analysis of the individual inventory items. A considerable amount of judgement is required in assessing the ultimate realisation of these inventories, including the current market prices and movement trends.

The carrying amounts of the group's and the company's inventories are disclosed in Note 8 to the financial statements.

The amounts receivable from these customers represented approximately 38% (2019:46%) of the total trade receivables of the group and the company. Management believes that the financial standing of these customers which are major multinational corporations substantially mitigates the group's exposure to credit risk.

At the reporting date, there are no significant concentrations of credit risk for financial assets designated at FVTPL. The carrying amount reflected above represents the group's maximum exposure to credit risk for such assets.

Collateral held as security and other credit enhancements

The group does not hold any collateral or other credit enhancements to cover its credit risks associated with its financial assets.

(vi) Liquidity risk management

The group maintains sufficient cash and bank balances, and internally generated cash flows to finance their activities. The group finances its operations by a combination of equity and bank borrowings. In addition, the group manages liquidity risk by (a) use of liquid assets and; (b) available borrowing facilities to meet the liquidity needs.

32 SUBSEQUENT EVENT REVIEW

On January 30, 2020, the World Health Organisation declared the COVID-19 outbreak a "Public Health Emergency of International Concern" and on March 10, 2020, declared it to be a pandemic. The COVID-19 and actions taken to mitigate it have had and are expected to continue to have an adverse impact on the economies and financial markets of many countries, including the geographical areas in which the Group operates.

As at the date of the financial statements, management has assessed the impact of the COVID-19 outbreak and have noted that operations are still continuing and expected to continue and at this point there has been no significant supply chain disruptions or significant dampening of demand for its products.

In view of the current situation arising from the pandemic, market sentiments may continue to change post the valuation performed for the group's investment properties as at March 31, 2020.

Notwithstanding the aforesaid, the COVID-19 outbreak has impacted the global economy and the situation relating to COVID-19 remains uncertain. Therefore, it is currently not possible to ascertain the full financial impact it may have on the financial performance of the Group in the next 12 months from the end of the reporting period. However, the group has assessed that it will be able to continue as a going concern taking into consideration available resources.

Subsequent to the year ended 31 March 2020, the Group has incorporated a wholly-owned subsidiary, Chem Integrated Management Pte. Ltd. with a paid-up share capital of \$1 comprising 1 ordinary share.
