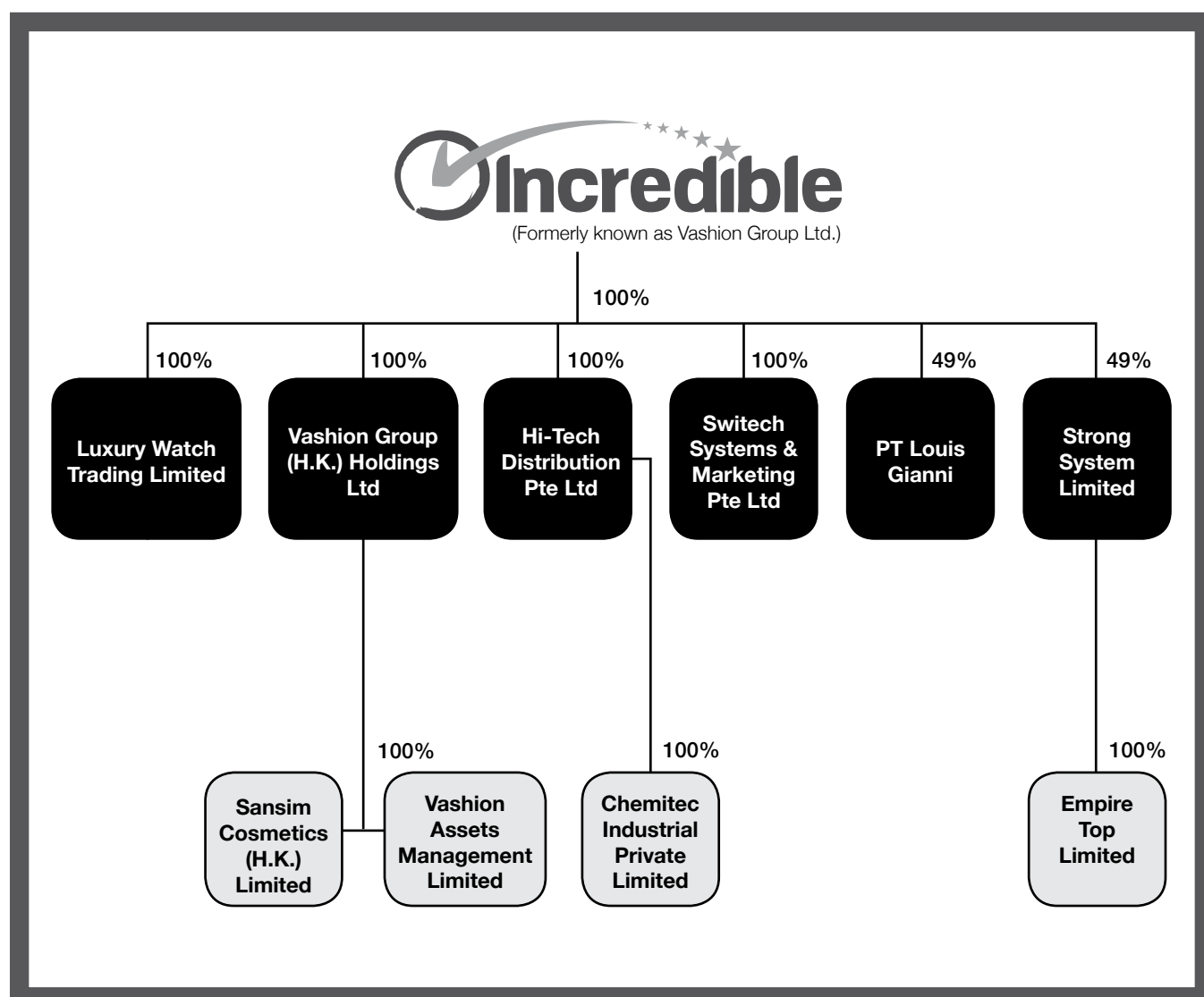

CORPORATE PROFILE

Incredible Holdings Ltd. and its subsidiaries (“the Group”) focus its core business on distribution of equipment and consumable materials for the electronics industry and switchgear design & assembly services in Singapore and trading of luxury goods in Hong Kong.

CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

DEAR SHAREHOLDERS,

On behalf of the board of directors for Incredible Holdings Ltd (the “Company”) and its subsidiaries collectively, (the “Group”), it is my pleasure to present to you the Annual Report for financial year ended 31 December 2019 (“FY2019”).

In the current weak global economies, most sectors of the Singapore economy were negatively impacted. The Group also faced a challenging business environment in FY2019. The Group will continue to focus on productivity improvement and cost management to sustain its existing businesses in the coming year. The Group will also explore investment opportunities to achieve the long-term goal of enhancing our shareholders' value.

BUSINESS OPERATIONS AND FINANCIAL RESULTS REVIEW

The Group's revenue decreased approximately by S\$2.2 million or 20.10% from S\$11.0 million in FY2018 to S\$8.8 million in FY2019. Revenue contributed from distribution of consumable material for electronic industry dropped by 27.49% from S\$2.8 million in FY2018 to S\$2 million in FY2019 mainly due to the trade tension between United States and China, which resulted in the overall slowdown in electronics manufacturing industries. Revenue recorded from trading of luxury goods dropped by 18.21% from S\$8.3 million in FY2018 to S\$6.8 million in FY2019 mainly due to the political events in Hong Kong.

The gross profit margin of the Group slightly increased from 5.36% in FY2018 to 6.17% in FY2019. The gross profit of the Group decreased from S\$589 thousand in FY2018 to S\$541 thousand in FY2019.

In continuing operations, other operating income recorded S\$6 thousand in FY2019 as compared to S\$455 thousand in FY2018 mainly due to exchange gain from foreign currency translation of S\$0.4 million and distribution of club membership of S\$49 thousand in FY2018. The selling and distribution expenses slightly decreased by S\$22 thousand and recorded approximately S\$232 thousand in FY2019 (FY2018: S\$254 thousand). The administrative expenses remained constant and recorded approximately S\$2.3 million in FY2019 and FY2018. The other

operating expenses recorded \$124 thousand in FY2019 as compared to S\$7 thousand in FY2018 due to write off of other receivables. Finance expenses in FY2019 relate to interest expenses from hire purchase and lease liabilities.

The loss from discontinued operations dropped from S\$404 thousand in FY2018 to S\$29 thousand in FY2019.

FINANCIAL POSITION REVIEW

The non-current assets as at 31 December 2019 of S\$1.3 million included investment in associate and property, plant, and equipment of S\$137 thousand. The increase in property, plant, and equipment was a result of the rights-of-use assets for lease adoption.

The current assets of the Group decreased by approximately S\$2 million or 33.9% from S\$5.9 million as at 31 December 2018 to S\$3.9 million as at 31 December 2019. Inventories decreased by approximately S\$1.6 million from S\$2.3 million as at 31 December 2018 to S\$0.8 million as at 31 December 2019 as a result of a decrease in stock level for trading of luxury goods business. The decline in trade and other receivables by S\$182 thousand result from settlement from customers. As at 31 December 2019, all trade receivables are within their credit terms. The decline in cash and bank balance by S\$303 thousand was a result from the settlement of payables and expenses. The due from associate recorded S\$1.7 million as at 31 December 2019 was attributable to the advance to Strong System Limited for the joint venture business as announced on 13 April 2018.

The current liabilities of the Group recorded S\$1.1 million as at 31 December 2019. The non-current liabilities of the Group increased from S\$5 thousand as at 31 December 2018 to S\$62 thousand as at 31 December 2019 as a result of adoption of lease liabilities during the year.

CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

The drop in net working capital of approximately S\$2.2 million from S\$4.9 million in FY2018 to S\$2.7 million in FY2019 was mainly due to a significant decrease in current assets by approximately S\$2 million from S\$5.9 million in FY2018 to S\$3.9 million in FY2019.

COMMENTARY ON CASH FLOW

The Group has a negative operating cash flow before working capital changes of approximately S\$2 million as at 31 December 2019 mainly due to loss of approximately S\$2.4 million and adjustment made to non-cash items of (i) unrealised exchange loss of S\$88 thousand; (ii) depreciation of S\$85 thousand; (iii) interest expenses of S\$2 thousand and (iv) share of loss of associate of S\$155 thousand.

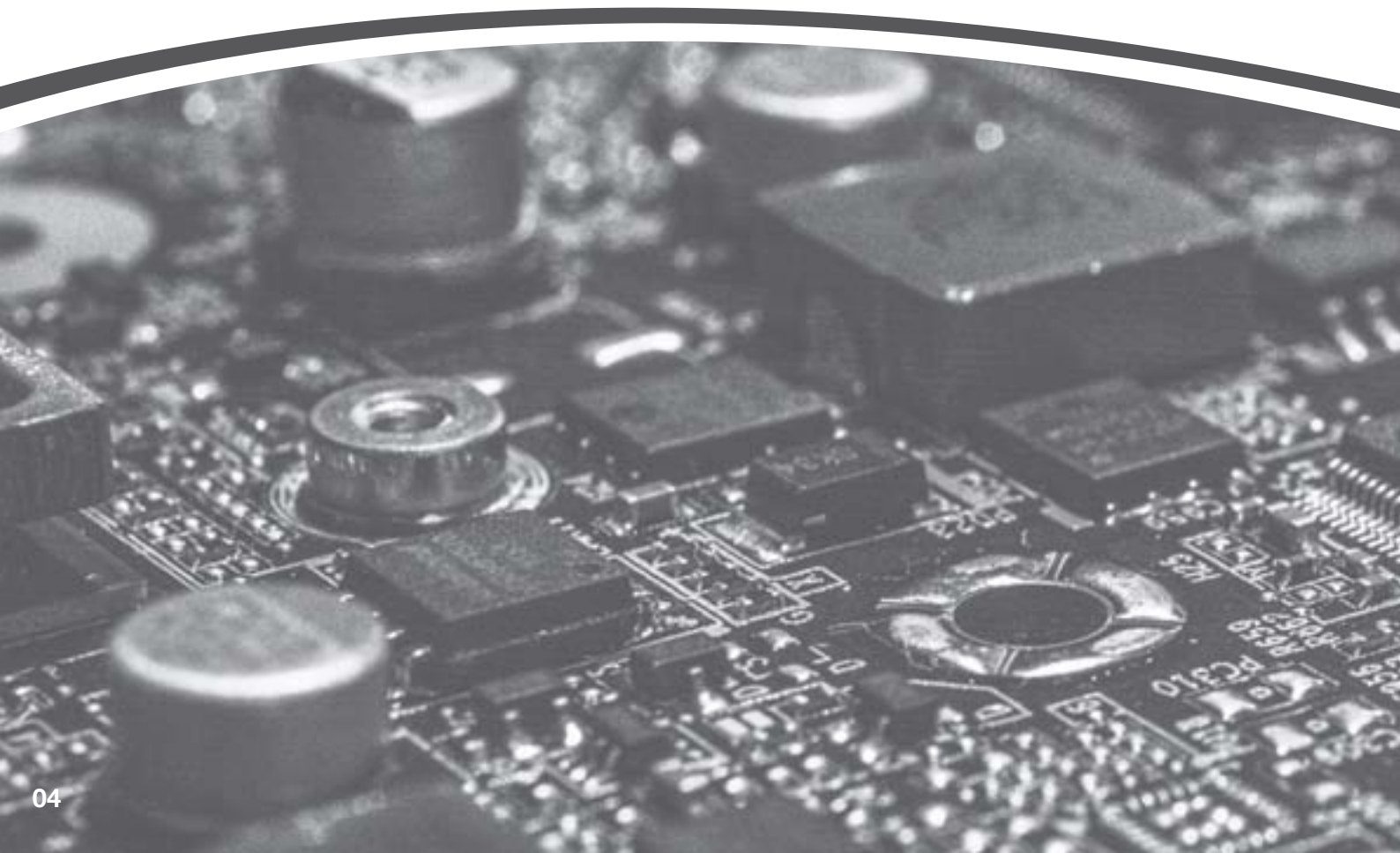
Net cash used in operating activities of approximately S\$0.4 million was mainly due to (i) decrease in inventories of S\$1.6 million; (ii) decrease in trade and other receivables of S\$153 thousand

and (iii) decrease in trade and other payables of S\$42 thousand. Net cash of S\$16 thousand was used in investing activities as at 31 December 2019 as a result of purchasing additional plant and equipment for the operation of distribution business. Net cash generated from financing activities of S\$74 thousand as at 31 December 2019 was due to advance from a director of the Company. The advance is unsecured, interest-free and repayable on demand in cash.

CORPORATE DEVELOPMENTS AND BUSINESS OUTLOOK

BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

The Group carried out an internal restructuring towards the end of 2019 to focus the resources on its scalable core business. Since the commencement of the trading of luxury goods, the Group has gained market share in Hong Kong and Singapore. The source of revenue was widened to include sale of luxury goods to young individuals and professionals.



CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

The outlook of the distribution of consumables to electronic manufacturer business segments remain constant and stable in the next twelve months based on the feedback from the business dealings with our long term customers.

The emergence of Covid-19 in December 2019 has brought about uncertainties to the Group's operating environment. The Company will continuously monitor the impact of Covid-19 on its operations and its financial performance. The Group will also be taking appropriate and timely measures to minimise the impact of the outbreak on the Group's operations.

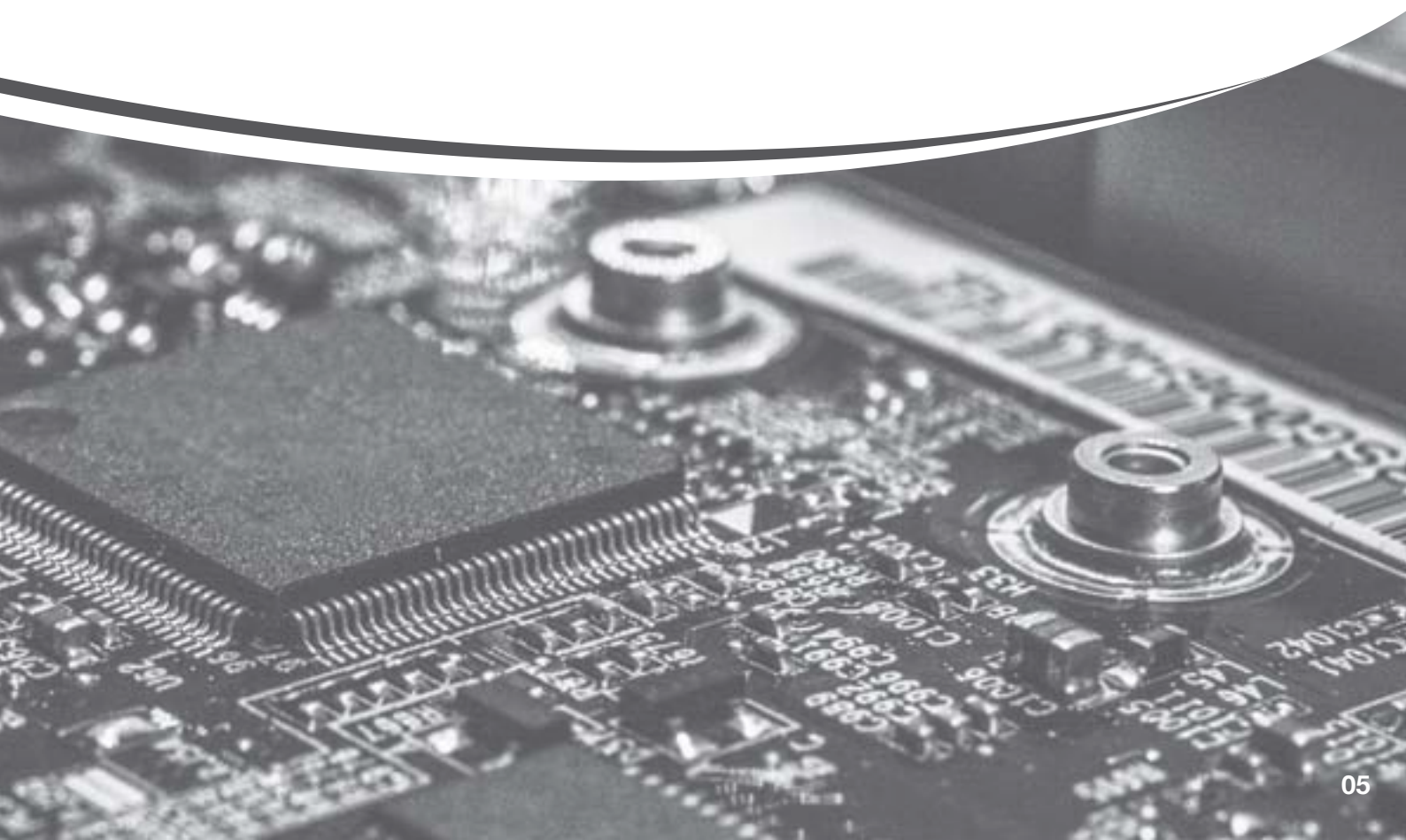
NOTE OF APPRECIATION

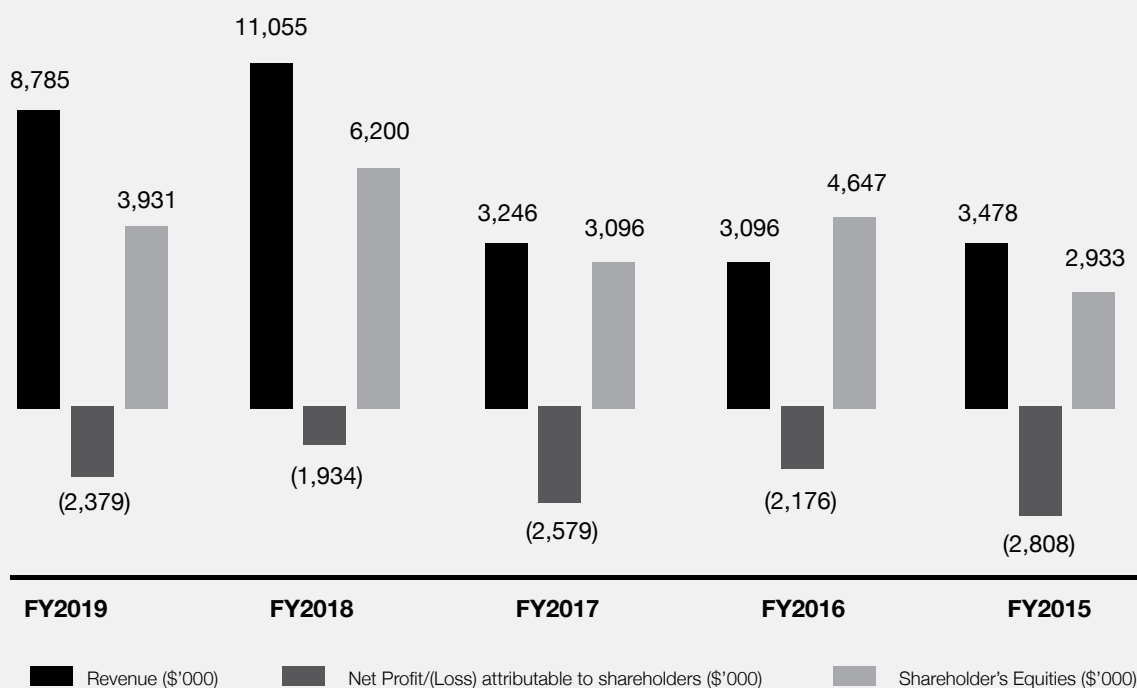

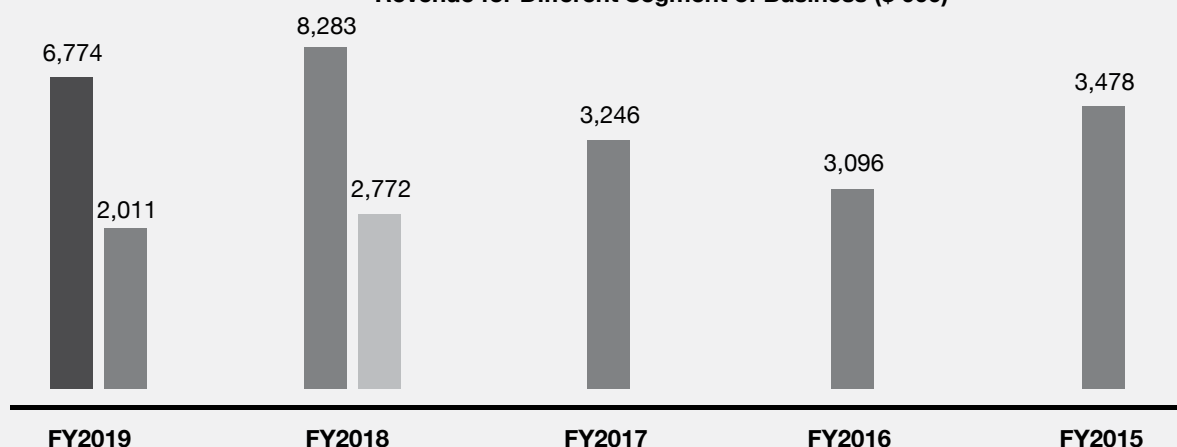

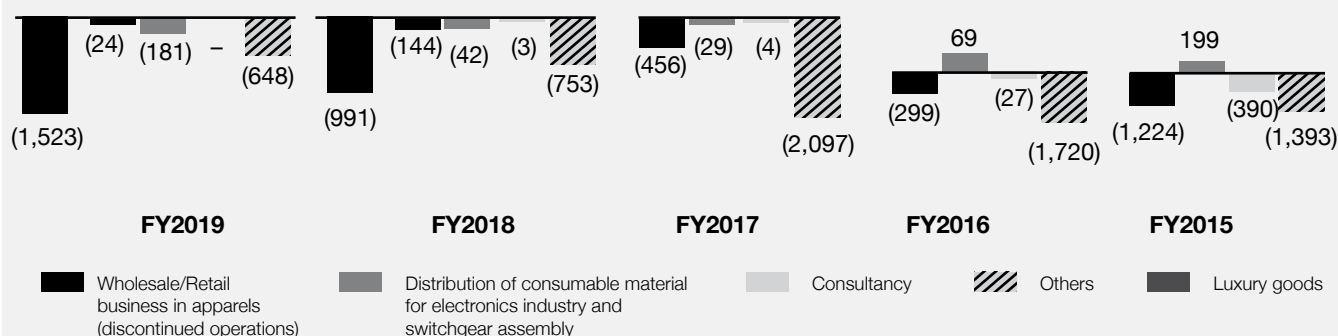

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE STATEMENT

The Board of Directors (the “**Board**”) of Incredible Holdings Ltd. (the “**Company**”) is committed to ensuring and maintaining a high standard of corporate governance within the Group. This report describes the corporate governance framework and practices of the Company with specific reference to the principles and guidelines set out in the 2018 Code of Corporate Governance (the “**Code**”) and areas of non-compliance have been explained in the report.

BOARD CONDUCT OF ITS AFFAIRS

PRINCIPLE 1: The company is headed by an effective Board which is collectively responsible and works with Management for the long term success of the company.

Role of Board of Directors

The Board’s primary role is to protect and enhance long-term shareholders’ value. It provides entrepreneurial leadership, sets the overall strategy for the Group and ensures that the necessary financial and human resources are in place for the Company to meet its objectives. The Board establishes a framework of prudent and effective controls which enables risks to be assessed and managed, including safeguarding of shareholders’ interests and the Company’s assets, supervises the Management and review management performance and monitors performance of these goals to enhance shareholders’ value. The Board is responsible for the overall corporate governance of the Group at all times as fiduciaries in the interests of the Company.

The Board’s role includes identifying the key stakeholder groups and ensure transparency and accountability to the key stakeholder groups, and instilling an ethical corporate culture and ensure that the company’s values, standards, policies and practices are consistent with the culture. The Board oversees the overall strategic plans including sustainability, environmental and social factors as part of its strategic formulation and financial objectives of the Group.

Directors’ Duties and Responsibilities

All directors discharge their duties and responsibilities objectively at all times as fiduciaries in the interest of the Group and exercise due diligence in dealing with the business affairs of the Group and are obliged to act in good faith in the interest of the Group. The Board puts in place a code of conduct and ethics, sets appropriate tone-from-the-top and desired organisational culture, and ensures proper accountability within the Group. Directors facing conflicts of interest recuse themselves from discussions and decisions involving the issues of conflict.

Directors must understand the Group’s businesses as well as their directorship duties (including their roles as executive, non-executive and independent directors). The Company has in place a process of induction, training and development for new and existing directors.

Orientation, briefings, updates and trainings for Directors in FY2019

The Company has in place an orientation process. A new incoming director is issued a formal letter of appointment setting out his duties and obligations. Incoming directors joining the Board will be briefed by the NC on their directors’ duties and obligations and be introduced to the Group’s business and governance practices and arrangements, in particular the Company’s policies relating to the disclosure of interests in securities, disclosure of conflicts of interest in transactions involving the Company, prohibition on dealings in the Company’s securities and restrictions on the disclosure of price-sensitive information.

Directors are provided with opportunities to develop and maintain their skills and knowledge at the company’s expense. The Company provides training and/or briefing for first-time director and existing directors in areas such as accounting, legal and industry-specific knowledge as appropriate. The training of directors is arranged and funded by the Company.

The incoming director will meet up with the senior management and the Company Secretary to familiarize himself with their roles, organization structure and business practices. This will enable him to get acquainted with senior management and the Company Secretary thereby facilitating board interaction and independent access to senior management and the Company Secretary.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE STATEMENT

The Directors are required and have each signed the respective undertaking in the form set out in Appendix 7H of the Rules of Catalist of the Singapore Exchange Securities Trading Limited (the “SGX-ST”) (“Catalist Rules”) to undertake to use their best endeavours to comply with the Catalist Rules and to procure that the Company shall so comply.

During the financial year reported on, the Directors had received updates on regulatory changes to the Listing Rules, amendments to the Companies Act and the accounting standards. The Executive Director updates the Board at each Board meeting on business and strategic developments. The management highlights the salient issues as well as the risk management considerations for the entire business of the Group.

Reserved matters for Board’s approval

Matters specifically reserved to the Board for its approval are:

- Issuing of shares
- Bank borrowing
- Material acquisitions or disposal of assets
- Approval of half-yearly and year-end results announcement and other public announcements
- Secretarial matters
- Appointments of officers and persons related to CEO/Executive Director and executive director
- Establishment of Board Committees

All these matters are clearly communicated to the management in writing.

Delegation by the Board

Board Committees, namely the Audit Committee (“AC”), Nominating Committee (“NC”), Remuneration Committee (“RC”) and Investment Committee (“IC”) (hereinafter referred as “**Board Committees**”) have been constituted to assist the Board in carrying out and discharging its duties and responsibilities efficiently and effectively. The Board Committees function within clearly defined terms of references and operating procedures which are reviewed on a regular basis. The effectiveness of each Board Committee is also constantly reviewed by the Board. Please refer to Principles 4 to 10 on the terms and reference and activities of the NC, RC and AC respectively.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE STATEMENT

While the Board considers Directors' attendance at Board meetings to be important, it should not be the only criterion to measure their contributions. It also takes into account the contributions by Board members in other forms including periodical reviews and provision of guidance and advice on various matters relating to the Group. The minutes of the Board and Committee meetings will be circulated to all directors including those absent from the meeting and the absent director will be given opportunity to contribute their valuable feedback through email or conference call if required. The Board has noted that this arrangement is effective to assist the Board for making decision.

Board's Access to Management, Company Secretary and external advisers

The Board has separate and independent access to senior management and the Company Secretary, and external advisers (where necessary) at the company's expense. The appointment and removal of the company secretary is a decision of the Board as a whole at all times. Management deals with requests for information from the Board promptly as needed to make informed decisions. The Board is informed of all material events and transactions as and when they occur.

Information provided included board papers and related materials, background or explanatory information relating to matters to be brought before the Board, and copies of disclosure documents, budgets, forecasts and quarterly internal financial statements and as and when requested by directors. Management provides directors with complete, adequate and timely information prior to meetings and on an on-going basis to enable them to make informed decisions and discharge their duties and responsibilities. In respect of budgets, any material variance between the projections and actual results are disclosed and explained by the CFO where appropriate.

The Company Secretary assists the Board to ensure that board procedures are followed and that the Company complies with all rules and regulations that are applicable to the Company.

Each Director has the right to seek independent legal and other professional advice, at the Company's expense, concerning any aspect of the Group's operations or undertakings in order to fulfill their duties and responsibilities as directors.

The role of the company secretary is to ensure that board procedures are followed and that applicable rules and regulations are complied with. Under the direction of the Chairman, the company secretary's responsibilities include ensuring good information flows within the Board and its board committees and, advising the Board on all corporate governance matters as well as facilitating orientation and assisting with professional development as required. The company secretary or her representative attends all board meetings.

The appointment of the company secretary is a matter for the Board's approval as a whole and the resignation of the company secretary is for noting by the Board.

BOARD COMPOSITION AND GUIDANCE

PRINCIPLE 2: The Board has an appropriate level of independence and diversity of thought and background in its composition to enable it to make decisions in the best interests of the company

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE STATEMENT

The Board examines its size to satisfy that it is an appropriate size for effective decision making, taking into account the nature and scope of the Company's operations. The Directors are also from diverse background and areas of expertise, such as accounting, business management and finance and information technology. The Board has two female members adding gender to the Board's diversity of background, experience and expertise. The Directors bring to the Board their related experience, knowledge and also provide guidance in the various Board Committees, that is, the AC, RC, NC and IC.

Independent Directors

The criterion for independence is based on the definition given in the Code and the Catalist Rules. The Code has defined an "independent director" as one who is independent in conduct, character and judgement and who has no relationship with the Company, its related corporations, its substantial shareholders or its officers that could interfere, or be reasonably perceived to interfere, with the exercise of the director's independent business judgment with a view to in the best interests of the Company. Under the Catalist Rules 406(3), an independent director is not one who is or has been employed by the Company or any of its related corporations for the current or any of the past three financial years; or not one who has an immediate family member who is, or has been in any of the past three financial years, employed by the Company or any of its related corporations and whose remuneration is determined by the RC.

The Independent Directors, Mr Leung Kwok Kuen Jacob, Ms Eunice Veon Koh Pei Lee and Mr Stanley Leung Yu Tung have confirmed their independence and they do not have any relationship with the Company, its related corporations, its substantial shareholders or its officers that could interfere, or be reasonably perceived to interfere, with the exercise of their independent judgment. They have also confirmed their independence in accordance with the Catalist Rules. The NC is of the view that Mr Leung Kwok Kuen Jacob, Ms Eunice Veon Koh Pei Lee and Mr Stanley Leung Yu Tung have engaged the Board in constructive discussion, their contributions are relevant and reasoned, and they have exercised independent judgment without dominating the Board discussions. The NC has reviewed and considered them to be independent. While none of the Independent Directors have served on the Board for a period exceeding nine years from the date of their first appointments, nonetheless the NC will review succession plans for directors and will seek to refresh the Board in an orderly manner as and when it deems appropriate. Mr Leung Kwok Kuen Jacob and Ms Eunice Veon Koh Pei Lee have each abstained from the NC's deliberation and decision on their independence.

Role of Non-Executive Directors

During the year reported, the Non-Executive Directors (which include the Independent Directors) constructively challenge and help develop both the Group's short-term and long-term business strategies. Management's progress and performance in implementing such agreed business strategies are monitored by the Non-Executive Directors.

The Non-Executive Directors and Independent Directors communicate among themselves without the presence of Management as and when the need arises, and thereafter where appropriate, they provide inputs to the Board. The Company also benefits from Management's ready access to its Directors for guidance and exchange of views both within and outside the formal environment of the Board and Board committee meetings.

CHAIRMAN AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

PRINCIPLE 3: There is a clear division of responsibilities between the leadership of the Board and Management, and no one individual has unfettered powers of decision-making.

Separate Role of Chairman and Chief Executive Officer

The Company does not have a Chief Executive Officer. The Company tasked its sole Executive Director, Mr Christian Kwok-Leun Yau Heilesen to oversee the day-to-day management of the Company and the Group's affairs. The functions of Independent Non-Executive Chairman and the Executive Director are assumed by two (2) individuals. As the Company has a separate Independent Non-Executive Chairman and an Executive Director, there is a balance of power and authority, increased accountability and greater capacity of the Board. The roles of Independent Non-Executive Chairman and Executive

Director are separate and they are not related. Mr Leung Kwok Kuen Jacob as Independent Non-Executive Chairman, is primarily responsible for overseeing the overall management and strategic development of the Company.

His responsibilities include:

- leading the Board to ensure its effectiveness on all aspects of its role;
- Chairing meetings on key strategic development and investment plans;
- Ensuring regular meetings (with the assistance of the Company Secretary) to enable the Board to perform its duties responsibly while not interfering with the flow of the Group's operations;
- Preparing meeting agenda (in consultation with the Executive Director and CFO) and set the agenda to ensure that adequate time is available for discussion of all agenda items, particularly strategic issues;
- Promoting a culture of openness and debate at the Board's level;
- Ensuring that the directors receive complete, adequate and timely information;
- Ensuring the Company is in compliance with the Code;
- Reviewing board papers that are presented to the Board;
- Ensuring effective communication with shareholders;
- Encouraging constructive relations within the Board and between the Board and Management;
- Facilitating the effective contribution of non-executive directors in particular; and
- Promoting high standards of corporate governance.

In assuming his roles and responsibilities, as Mr Leung Kwok Kuen Jacob consults with the Board, AC, NC, RC and IC on major issues in the future time and as such, the Board believes that there are adequate safeguards in place against having a concentration of power and authority in a single individual.

The Executive Director, Mr Christian Kwok-Leun Yau who is responsible for the day-to-day management of business, developing and managing the business development strategies, establishing new business opportunities for growth and expansion and reports to the Board and ensures that policies and strategies adopted by the Board are implemented.

The Code requires the appointment of a Lead Independent Director if the Chairman is conflicted. The Company does not have a Lead Independent Director as the Chairman is an Independent Director, and together with the other Independent Directors individually and collectively are available to shareholders where they have concerns in which contact through the normal channels of the Management and Executive Directors has failed to resolve or is inappropriate.

BOARD MEMBERSHIP

PRINCIPLE 4: The Board has a formal and transparent process for the appointment and re-appointment of directors, taking into account the need for progressive renewal of the Board

The NC comprises the following members, the majority of whom including the Chairman are independent: -

The functions of the NC are as follows: -

- to make recommendations to the Board on all board appointments and re-nominations having regard to the director's contribution and performance (eg. attendance, preparedness, participation, candour and any other salient factors);
- to ensure that all Directors submit themselves for re-nomination and re-election at regular intervals and at least once in every three years;

- c. to determine annually whether a Director is independent, in accordance with the independence guidelines contained in the Code;
- d. to decide whether a Director is able to carry and has adequately carried out his duties as a Director of the Company, in particular, where the Director concerned has multiple board representations;
- e. to decide how the performance of the Board, its Board Committees and Directors may be evaluated and to propose objective performance criteria;
- f. to review the succession plans for directors, particularly, the Independent Non-Executive Chairman of the Board, the CEO/ Executive Director and key management personnel; and
- g. to review training and professional development programs for the Board.

Selection, Appointment and Re-appointment of directors

The Company has in place the policy and procedures for the appointment of new directors, including the search and nomination process. The search for a suitable candidate could be drawn from contacts and the network of existing Directors. The NC can approach relevant institutions such as the Singapore Institute of Directors, professional organisations or business federations to source for a suitable candidate.

The NC will deliberate and propose the background, skills, qualification and experience of the candidate it deems appropriate. The factors taken into consideration by the NC could include, among other things, whether the new director can add to or complement the mix of skills and qualifications in the existing Board, relevance of his experience and contributions to the business of the Company and the depth and breadth he could bring to Board discussions.

New directors will be appointed by way of a Board resolution, after the NC makes the necessary recommendation to the Board. New directors joining the Board would receive a formal appointment letter setting out their duties and obligations, be briefed by the NC on their directors' duties and obligations and introduced to the Group's business and governance practice and, particularly, the Company's policies relating to the disclosure of interests in securities, disclosure of conflicts of interest in transactions involving the Group, prohibitions on dealings in the Company's securities and restrictions on the disclosure of price-sensitive and trade sensitive information.

The Constitution of the Company requires one-third of the Board to retire from office at each annual general meeting. Accordingly, the Directors will submit themselves for re-nomination and re-election at regular intervals of at least once every three years.

Pursuant to the Constitution of the Company, Mr Leung Yu Tung Stanley and Ms Eunice Veon Koh Pei Lee will retire by rotation at the forthcoming annual general meeting and are eligible for re-election. The NC has recommended to the Board, the re-election of Mr Leung Yu Tung Stanley and Ms Eunice Veon Koh Pei Lee at the forthcoming Annual General Meeting ("AGM").

In making recommendation for the purpose of re-nomination of these Directors, the NC has taken into consideration these Directors' contribution and performance. The Board has accepted the NC's recommendation.

Determining Directors' Independence

Annually, the Directors submit declarations on their independence to the NC for assessment. The NC reviews the independence of each Director annually, and as and when circumstances require, in accordance with the requirements of the SGX-ST Listing Manual and the provisions of the Code, and also taking into account the guidance in the relevant Practice Guidance. A Director is considered independent if he is independent in conduct, character and judgment, and has no relationship with the Company, its related corporations, its substantial shareholders or its officers that could interfere, or be reasonably perceived to interfere, with the exercise of his independent business judgment with a view to the best interests of the Company. Each member of the NC and the Board abstained from the NC's and the Board's deliberations in respect of his own independence assessment.

Multiple Board Representations

The NC had considered and the Board had concurred that it would not be appropriate to set a limit on the number of directorships that a Director may hold because directors have different capabilities, and the nature of the organisations in which they hold appointments and the kind of committees on which they serve are of different complexities. It is for each Director to personally determine the demands of his or her competing directorships and obligations and assess the number of directorships they could hold and serve effectively. The company discloses in its annual report the listed company directorships and principal commitment of each director. A safeguard is the annual review by the NC of each Director's time commitment and performance and assessment whether each Director has discharged his duties adequately.

BOARD PERFORMANCE

PRINCIPLE 5: The Board undertakes a formal annual assessment of its effectiveness as a whole, and that of each of its board committees and individual directors

Board Performance

Each year, the Directors are to complete evaluation forms to assess the overall effectiveness of the Board and the Board Committees, as well as conduct a self-assessment. The results of the evaluation exercise were considered by the NC, which then made recommendations to the Board, aimed at assisting the Board to discharge its duties more effectively.

In assessing the Board's effectiveness, the NC considers a number of factors, including the discharge of the Board's functions, access to information, Directors' participation at board meetings and communication and guidance given by the Board to top management.

In evaluating the Board's and Board Committees performance, the NC implements an assessment process that requires each Director to submit an assessment form of the performance of the Board and Board Committees as a whole during the financial year under review. This assessment process takes into account, inter alia, performance indicators such as the Board composition, maintenance of independence, Board and Board Committees information, Board and Board Committees process, Board and Board Committees accountability, communication with Management and standard of conduct. The results of the assessment exercise were reviewed by the NC and the NC also considered the contribution by each director towards the achievement of the Board and Board Committees for each of the performance indicator.

The contribution of each individual Director to the effectiveness of the Board and Board Committees, where the individual director sits on Board Committee(s) is assessed individually and reviewed by the NC Chairman. The assessment criteria include, inter alia, commitment of time, knowledge and abilities, teamwork, overall effectiveness. The NC's evaluation is shared with the Board and the Chairman would act on the results of the performance evaluation, and in consultation with the NC, propose, where appropriate, new members to be appointed to the Board or seek the resignation of directors.

The NC has reviewed the overall performance of the Board and Board Committees in terms of each role and responsibilities and the conduct of individual Directors' performance individually and contribution to the Board and Board Committees as the case may be for FY2019 and is of the view that the performance of the Board as a whole, the Board Committees and each individual Director, has been satisfactory. Although some of the Board members have multiple board representations, the NC is satisfied that sufficient time and attention has been given to the Group by these Directors.

No external facilitator was used in the process to conduct the evaluations.

RC will have access to expert advice in the field of executive compensation outside the Company when required. For FY2019, the Company has not engaged any remuneration consultant.

The RC's role is to review and approve recommendations on remuneration policies and packages for the Directors and key management personnel. The review will cover all aspects of remuneration including but not limited to directors' fees, salaries, allowances, bonus, options and benefits in kind. The RC's recommendations are made in consultation with the Independent Non-Executive Chairman of the Board and submitted for endorsement by the entire Board.

The payment of fee to Directors is subject to approval at the annual general meeting of the Company. No Director is involved in deciding his own remuneration.

The RC reviews all aspects of remuneration, including the company's obligations arising in the event of termination of the Executive Director and key management personnel's contracts of service, to ensure that such contracts of service contain fair and reasonable termination clauses which are not overly generous. The RC aims to be fair and avoid rewarding poor performance.

The annual reviews of the compensation are carried out by the RC to ensure that the remuneration of the Executive Directors and key management personnel commensurate with their responsibility and performance and that of the Company, giving due regard to the financial and business needs of the Group. A significant and appropriate proportion of executive directors' and key management personnel's remuneration should be structured so as to link rewards to corporate and individual performance. Such performance-related remuneration should be aligned with the interests of shareholders and promote the long-term success of the company.

In addition, in discharging its functions, the RC may obtain independent external professional advice as it deems necessary and the cost of which will be borne by the Company.

Each member of the RC shall abstain from voting on any resolutions in respect of his or her own remuneration package. Long-term incentive schemes are generally encouraged for executive directors and key management personnel. The RC may review whether Executive directors and key management personnel should be eligible for benefits under long-term incentive schemes. The costs and benefits of long-term incentive schemes should be carefully evaluated. In normal circumstances, offers of shares or grants of options or other forms of deferred remuneration should vest over a period of time. The use of vesting schedules, whereby only a portion of the benefits can be exercised each year, is also strongly encouraged. Executive Directors and key management personnel should be encouraged to hold their shares beyond the vesting period, subject to the need to finance any cost of acquiring the shares and associated tax liability. Currently, the Company has a share-based compensation scheme named Incredible Holdings Performance Share Plan (formerly known as Vashion Performance Share Plan) approved by the shareholders at an extraordinary general meeting held on 6 September 2017. The RC administers the Scheme in accordance with the rules of the Scheme.

The Board concurred with the RC that the proposed Directors' fees for the year ended 31 December 2019 is appropriate and that the independent directors receive directors' fee in accordance with their level of contributions, taking into account factors such as effort and time spent for serving on the Board and Board Committees, as well as the responsibilities and obligations of the directors. The remuneration is also appropriate to attract, retain and motivate the directors to provide good stewardship of the company, and key management personnel to successfully manage the company for long term.

The Company does not have any share-based compensation schemes or any long-term scheme involving the offer of shares in place to encourage independent directors to hold shares in the Company. However, the RC may consider implementing the schemes that encourage non-executive directors to hold shares in the company so as to better align the interests of such non-executive directors.

Companies are encouraged to consider the use of contractual provisions to allow the company to reclaim incentive components of remuneration from executive directors and key management personnel in exceptional circumstances of misstatement of financial results, or of misconduct resulting in financial loss to the company. However, having reviewed and taken into consideration that there is no variable incentive components to the remuneration of Executive Directors and the key management personnel, the RC is of the view that there is no requirement to institute the abovementioned contractual provisions.

In setting remuneration packages, the company will take into consideration of pay and employment conditions within the industry and in comparable companies.

Remuneration Matters

The Board has recommended a fixed fee for Non-Executive Directors, taking into account the effort, time spent and responsibilities of each Non-Executive Director. The fee of Non-Executive Directors will be subjected to shareholders' approval at the Annual General Meeting.

The remuneration of Executive director and key management personnel comprises a basic salary based on the performance of the Group and their individual performance.

The Company has only three key management executives for FY2019. In aggregate, the total remuneration paid to them in financial year ended 31 December 2019 was S\$253,799.

The Board, after weighing the advantages and disadvantages of such disclosure, is of the view that full disclosure of the actual remuneration of each key management personnel pursuant to Rule 1204(12) of the Catalist Rules and Provision 9.1 of the Code would not be in the interests of the Company as such information is confidential and sensitive in nature, and can be exploited by competitors.

Immediate Family Member of Directors, CEO/Executive Director or Substantial Shareholders

There were two (2) employees during the financial period from 1 January 2019 to 31 December 2019 who were immediate family members of Executive Director whose remuneration exceeded S\$100,000.

Mr Henrick Yau Kwok Hang Heilesen is brother of Executive Director and Ms Siu Yik Tung is spouse of Executive Director. The remuneration of Mr Henrick Yau Kwok Hang Heilesen fell within the band of S\$200,000 and S\$300,000 and Ms Siu Yik Tung fell within the band of S\$100,000 and S\$200,000.

Save as disclosed, there are no other employees who are immediate family members of a Director whose remuneration exceed S\$100,000 for FY2019.

In setting the remuneration packages of the Executive Directors and officers, the Company takes into account of the contribution of the Executive Directors and officers to the group and that the remuneration is aligned to the long term interest and risk policies of the Group.

Performance Share Plan

Incredible Holdings Performance Share Plan (formerly known as Vashion Performance Share Plan) was approved by the shareholders at an extraordinary general meeting held on 6 September 2017. The RC administers the Scheme in accordance with the rules of the Scheme.

The Scheme, which forms an integral component of the Company's compensation plan, is designed to reward and retain eligible participants whose services are vital to the well-being and success of the Company. It provides eligible participants who have contributed to the success and development of the Company with an opportunity to participate, and also increases the dedication and loyalty of these participants and motivates them to perform better. The share option is granted based on performance criteria such as the position of the eligible employee, length of service and the performance score achieved by the eligible employee. No employees had met the performance criteria for FY2019.

Under the rules of the Scheme, Executive Directors and Non-Executive Directors (including Independent Directors) and employees of the Group, who are also controlling shareholders are eligible to participate in the Scheme.

The total number of new shares over which options may be granted pursuant to the Scheme, when added to the number of shares issued and issuable under such other share-based incentive plans (where applicable) of the Company, shall not exceed 15% of the issued share capital of the Company on the date preceding the grant of the options.

The number of options to be offered to a participant shall be determined at the discretion of the RC which shall take into account criteria such as rank, past performance, years of service and potential for future development of that participant. However, in relation to the associates of the controlling shareholders, the aggregate number of shares which may be offered shall not exceed 25% of the total number of shares available under the Scheme and the aggregate number of shares which may be offered to each associate of the controlling shareholders shall not exceed 10% of the shares available under the Scheme.

The options that are granted under the Scheme may have exercise prices that are, at the RC's discretion, set at a price (the "Market Price") equal to the average of the last dealt prices for the shares on the Official List of Catalist for the five consecutive trading days immediately preceding the relevant date of grant of the relevant option; or at a discount to the Market Price (subject to a maximum discount of 20%). Options which are fixed at the Market Price may be exercised after the first anniversary of the date of grant of that option while options exercisable at a discount to the Market Price may only be exercised after the second anniversary from the date of grant of the options.

The Scheme shall continue in operation for a maximum duration of 10 years and may be continued for any further period thereafter with the approval of the shareholders by ordinary resolution in general meeting and of any relevant authorities which may then be required.

There has been no shares issued since the commencement of the Scheme.

RISK MANAGEMENT AND INTERNAL CONTROLS

PRINCIPLE 9: The Board is responsible for the governance of risk. The Board should ensure that Management maintains a sound system of risk management and internal controls to safeguard shareholders' interests and the company's assets, and should determine the nature and extent of the significant risks which the Board is willing to take in achieving its strategic objectives

PRINCIPLE 10: The Board has an Audit Committee which discharges its duties objectively

Risk Management

The Board determines the Company's levels of risk tolerance and risk policies, and oversee Management in the design, implementation and monitoring of the risk management and internal control systems.

The AC oversees the Group's risk management process, through reviewing the adequacy and effectiveness of the risk management policy, practices and strategies. It also has oversight of key risk exposures and will in turn report to the Board of Directors on all risk matters. As the oversight of risk vests with the AC, the Board does not see the need to form a separate risk management committee comprising AC members.

The Group and the Company do not hold or issue derivative financial instruments for trading purposes or hedge against fluctuation in interest rates and foreign exchange rates. The steps taken by the Group to manage its exposure to financial risk are set out in the Financial Report on pages 91 to 100 of the Notes to the Financial Statements.

At the management level, the Group Risk Management Committee ("GRMC"), chaired by the Executive Director and comprising the management reports to the AC annually or more frequently as needed. The GRMC highlights significant risk issues, both existing and emerging, for discussion with the AC and the Board, taking into account the immediate operating environment and the next half-year prospects.

Annually, the Board reviews the adequacy and effectiveness of the Company's risk management and internal control systems, including financial, operational, compliance and information technology controls. These reviews are carried out internally or with the assistance of internal auditors appointed during the financial year just ended.

For the financial year ended 31 December 2019, the Board has received assurance from the Executive Director and the Chief Financial Officer that the financial records have been properly maintained and the financial statements give a true and fair view of the Group's operations and finances, and from the Executive Director and the Chief Financial Officer who are responsible that the company's risk management and internal control systems are adequate and effective.

The Group has implemented a stringent cost and cash flow management and all expenses would be approved by the top management and monthly cash flow forecast for the next twelve months would be circulated to the Board for monitoring and necessary actions.

Internal Audit and Internal Controls

The Group has outsourced its internal audit function to Virtus Assure Pte. Ltd. ("**Virtus**"), a professional service firm that specialises in the provision of Internal Audit, Enterprise Risk Management and Sustainability Reporting advisory services. Virtus was set up in the year 2005 and currently maintains an outsourced internal audit portfolio of SGX-ST listed companies in various industries. The engagement team comprises two certified internal audit directors with one of them having more than 30 years of internal audit experience, a manager and a senior internal auditor. The Board and AC decide on the appointment, termination and remuneration of the head of the internal audit function. Virtus has confirmed their independence as internal auditor to the Board.

The IA plan their audit schedules in consultation with, but independent of, the management. The IA plan is submitted to the AC for approval prior to implementation. The AC reviews the activities of the IA, and meets with the internal auditor to approve their plans and to review their report for the prior reporting period.

The IA will report their audit findings and recommendations directly to the Chairman of the AC. The IA has unfettered access to all the Group's documents, records, properties and personnel, including access to the AC.

The Board is of the opinion that the key financial, operational, compliance and information technology risks of the Group have been reduced materially, the revised system of internal controls recommended by Virtus have adequately addressed the key financial, operational, compliance and information technology risks of the Group.

Based on the Group's existing management controls in place, the internal control policies and procedures established and maintained by the Group, as well as the reviews performed by the external and internal auditors, the Board, is of the view that the internal control systems of the Group, addressing the financial, operational and compliance, information technology risks and risk management system are adequate and effective as at 31 December 2019. The AC concurred with the Board.

The AC may commission an independent audit on internal controls and risk management systems for its assurance, or where it is not satisfied with the systems of internal control controls and risk management.

The Board, having considered and assessed the suitability, adequacy of resources and experience of Virtus, is satisfied that the appointment of Virtus would assist and not compromise the standard and effectiveness of the internal audit of the Company.

The Board is of the view that the IA function being conducted by Virtus is staffed with persons with relevant qualifications and experience. IA has carried out its function according to the Standard for the Professional Practice of Internal Auditing set by the Institute of Internal Auditors.

The AC is satisfied and commented that the internal audit function is independent, effective and adequately resourced.

Audit Committee (AC)

The AC comprises three Non-Executive Directors, the majority of whom are independent. The members of the AC are:

The Chairman of the AC is Mr Stanley Leung Yu Tung, a member of Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountant. Mr Leung Kwok Kuen Jacob has extensive experience in administrative management. Ms Zhou Jia Lin has 15 years of management and investment experience. The Board is of the view that the members of the AC are appropriately qualified, having accounting or related financial and management expertise or experience as the Board interprets such qualification, to discharge their responsibilities.

The role and functions of the AC are specified in the Companies Act, Cap 50 and is guided by the AC's Terms of Reference adopted by the Board, which are as follows:-

- a. review annually with the external auditors the scope, audit plan, their evaluation of the system of internal accounting controls, their audit report, the independence and objectivity, their management letter and the management's response;
- b. review and report to the Board the risk management systems at least annually on the scope, adequacy, independence and effectiveness of the results of the external audit and the Group's internal controls and internal audit function, including financial, operational, compliance and information technology controls and review the assurance from the Executive Director and the CFO on the financial records and financial statements;
- c. review the interim and annual financial statements, announcements and balance sheets and income statements before submission to the Board for its approval, focusing in particular, on changes in accounting policies and practices, major risk areas, significant adjustments resulting from the audit, compliance with Financial Reporting Standards as well as compliance with any stock exchange and statutory regulatory requirements;
- d. ensure co-ordination between the external auditors and the management, review the assistance given by management to the auditors and discuss problems and concerns, if any, arising from the interim and final audits, and any matters which the auditors may wish to discuss (in the absence of management where necessary);
- e. review and discuss with the external auditors and at appropriate times, report the matter to the board and to the sponsor when there is any suspected fraud or irregularity, or suspected infringement of any relevant laws, rules or regulations, which has or is likely to have a material impact on the Group's operating results or financial position, and review the management's response;
- f. consider the appointment or re-appointment of the external auditors, the audit fee, terms of engagement and matters relating to the resignation or dismissal of the auditors;
- g. the AC shall meet with the external auditors and internal auditor without the presence of the Company's management at least once a year;
- h. review transactions falling within the scope of the Audit Committee Charter in respect of Interested Person Transactions and the Catalist Rules;

- i. undertake such other reviews and projects as may be requested by the Board and report to the Board its findings from time to time on matters arising and requiring the attention of the AC;
- j. ensure the integrity of the financial statements of the Company and any announcements relating to the Company's financial performance;
- k. review the policy and arrangements for concerns about possible improprieties in financial reporting or other matters to be safely raised, independently investigated and appropriately followed up on; and
- l. generally undertake such other functions and duties as may be required under the Audit Committee Charter, by statute or the Catalist Rules, and by such amendments made thereto from time to time.

Where the external auditors, in their review or audit of the Company's year-end financial statements, raise any significant issues which have a material impact on the interim financial statements or financial updates previously announced by the company, the AC should bring this to the Board's attention immediately.

The AC has explicit authority to investigate any matter within its terms of reference, full access to and co-operation by Management and full discretion to invite any director or executive officer to attend its meetings, and reasonable resources to enable it to discharge its functions properly. The Board is satisfied that the members of the AC have recent and relevant accounting or related financial management expertise or experience to discharge the AC's functions. The AC is kept abreast by the Management and the external auditors of changes to accounting standards, Listing Rules of the SGX-ST and other regulations which could have an impact on the Group's business and financial statements.

The AC does not comprise former partners or directors of the company's existing auditing firm or auditing corporation and the AC does not have any financial interest in the auditing firm or auditing corporation.

The Company held an extraordinary general meeting for the appointment of a new auditor and the resolution of appointment of new auditor of Baker Tilly TFW LLP ("New Auditors") was approved by shareholders on 6 March 2020. In accordance with the requirements of Rule 712(3) of the Catalist Rules:

- (i) The outgoing auditor, Moore Stephans LLP ("MS"), has confirmed to Baker Tilly, via its professional clearance letter dated 14 February 2020, that it is not aware of any professional reasons why Baker Tilly should not accept the appointment as auditors of the Company, Chemitech Industrial Private Limited, Hi-Tech Distribution Pte. Ltd. and Switech Systems & Marketing Pte. Ltd.;
- (ii) The Company confirms that there were no disagreements with MS on accounting treatments within the last 12 months up to the 17 February 2020;
- (iii) The Company confirms that it is not aware of any circumstances connected with the appointment of New Auditors that should be brought to the attention of Shareholders which has not been disclosed in circular dated 20 February 2020;
- (iv) The specific reasons for the appointment of New Auditors are disclosed in the circular dated 20 February 2020. The Company and MS was not able to reach a mutual agreement on the quantum of professional fees; and
- (v) The Company confirms that it complies with Rules 712 and 715 of the Catalist Rules in relation to the appointment of the New Auditors.

The Company confirms that it has complied with Catalist Rules 712 and 715. Baker Tilly TFW LLP is registered with the Accounting and Corporate Regulatory Authority, as the external auditors of the Company and all of its Singapore subsidiaries. The Company also engaged Baker Tilly Hong Kong Limited, registered with the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants, as the external auditors of all its Hong Kong subsidiaries. The Board and the Audit Committee are satisfied that the appointment of different auditors for its Hong Kong subsidiaries would not compromise the standard and effectiveness of the audit of the Group, and accordingly, Rule 716 of the Catalist Rules has been complied with.

The audit fees to external auditors in 2019 were S\$68,000 and there is no non-audit service rendered by the external auditor.

To keep abreast of the changes in accounting standards and issues which have a direct impact on financial statements, discussions are held with the External Auditors when they attend the AC meetings every half yearly. The AC members were encouraged to attend external courses conducted by relevant professional institutes as and when deemed necessary or upon request.

The AC meets with both the internal and external auditors without the presence of the Management at least once a year.

The AC has recommended to the Board of Directors that the external auditors, Baker Tilly TFW LLP be nominated for re-appointment as auditors at the forthcoming AGM of the Company.

For the purpose of Rules 715 to 717, a subsidiary or associated company is considered significant if its net tangible assets represent 20% or more of the issuer's consolidated net tangible assets, or its pre-tax profits account for 20% or more of the issuer's consolidated pre-tax profits.

The company publicly discloses, and clearly communicates to employees, the existence of a whistle-blowing policy and procedures for raising such concerns.

The Company has in place a whistle-blowing framework where staff of the Company can access the AC Chairman to raise concerns about improprieties.

Employees are free to bring complaints in confidence to the attention of their supervisors. The recipient of such complaints shall forward them promptly to the AC Chairman. The Group will treat all information received confidentially and protect the identity and the interest of all whistleblowers. Following investigation and evaluation of a complaint, the AC Chairman shall report to the AC on recommended disciplinary or remedial action, if any. The action determined by the AC to be appropriated shall then be brought to the Board or to appropriate members of senior management for authorization and implementation respectively. An employee can access the AC Chairman directly to raise concern if he feels that it could not be effectively addressed at managerial level.

The policy is communicated to all employees as part of the Group's efforts to promote awareness of fraud control.

The Company respects the equal information rights of all shareholders and is committed to the practice of fair, transparent and timely disclosure.

Shareholders are given the opportunity to participate effectively and vote at general meetings of the Company, where relevant rules and procedures governing the meetings are clearly communicated. The Company does not provide for absentia voting methods such as by mail, email, or fax due to concerns as to the integrity of such information and authentication of the identity of shareholders voting by such means. However, the Company's Constitution allows a member (other than a relevant intermediary as defined in Section 181 of the Companies Act) to appoint one or two proxies to attend and vote at its general meetings in his absence. The Companies Act allows relevant intermediaries which include CPF Approved Nominees to appoint multiple proxies, and empower CPF investors to attend and vote at general meetings of the Company as their CPF Approved Nominees' proxies.

At the general meetings of the Company, shareholders are given the opportunity to air their views and ask Directors questions regarding the Group. Shareholders are encouraged to attend the general meetings to ensure a high level of accountability and to stay informed of the Group's strategies and goals. The general meetings are the principal forum for dialogue with shareholders to gather views or inputs, and address shareholders' concerns.

The Directors, including chairpersons of each of the Board Committees are present at the general meetings to answer questions from the shareholders. Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Incredible Holdings Ltd. (the "Company") and its subsidiaries (the "Group") as set out on pages 45 to 104, which comprise the statements of financial position of the Group and of the Company as at 31 December 2019, and the consolidated statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income, consolidated statement of changes in equity and consolidated statement of cash flows of the Group and the statement of changes in equity of the Company for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying consolidated financial statements of the Group and the statement of financial position and statement of changes in equity of the Company are properly drawn up in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act, Chapter 50 (the "Act") and Singapore Financial Reporting Standards (International) ("SFRS(I)") so as to give a true and fair view of the consolidated financial position of the Group and the financial position of the Company as at 31 December 2019 and of the consolidated financial performance, consolidated changes in equity and consolidated cash flows of the Group and of the changes in equity of the Company for the year ended on that date.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Singapore Standards on Auditing ("SSAs"). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Group in accordance with the Accounting and Corporate Regulatory Authority (ACRA) *Code of Professional Conduct and Ethics for Public Accountants and Accounting Entities* (ACRA Code) together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Singapore, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the ACRA Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Key Audit Matters

Key audit matters are those matters that, in our professional judgement, were of most significance in our audit of the financial statements of the current financial year. These matters were addressed in the context of our audit of the financial statements as a whole, and in forming our opinion thereon, and we do not provide a separate opinion on these matters.

(i) Valuation of inventories

Description of key audit matter:

We refer to Note 2 for the relevant accounting policies; Note 3.3 on critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty and Note 17 for the breakdown of inventories.

As at 31 December 2019, the carrying amount of inventories amounted to \$776,496, which is approximately 15% of the Group's total assets. This is considered to be a key audit matter due to the element of judgement and estimates applied by management in determining the allowance for inventory obsolescence and the net realisable value of the inventories as disclosed in Note 3.3 to the financial statements.

Our audit procedures and response include:

- Reviewing and testing management's comparison of the carrying amount of inventories against subsequent selling price, to ensure inventories are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.
- Reviewing management's assessment of the allowance for inventory obsolescence, taking into consideration types of inventories, ageing profile of inventories, inventory turnover rate, selling price and external price data.
- Reviewing the adequacy of the disclosures made in financial statements.

Key Audit Matters (cont'd)

(ii) Estimation of loss allowance for trade receivables and amount due from an associated company

Description of key audit matter:

We refer to Note 2 for the relevant accounting policies; Note 3.4 on critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty and Notes 18 and 27(b) for the breakdown of trade receivables and amount due from an associate company and credit risk of the group respectively.

As at 31 December 2019, the Group has trade receivables and amount due from an associated company of \$696,257 and \$1,696,380, respectively, which are approximately 46% of the Group's total assets.

For trade receivables, management determines the expected credit losses ("ECL") by applying the simplified approach and using the provision matrix to measure the lifetime ECL for trade receivables. The Group categorises its trade receivables by its past due status and segregates debtors regarded as credit-impaired where one or more credit impairment events have occurred. The ECL rates for each category of debtors are estimated based on historical credit loss experience adjusted as appropriate to reflect current conditions and forecasts of future economic conditions.

For amount due from an associated company, management determines the ECL of by applying the general approach under SFRS(I) 9. Management has assessed that amount due from an associated company fall within "Stage 1" of SFRS(I) 9 Financial Instrument's impairment model as there is no significant increase in the credit risk since initial recognition and applied the 12-month ECL to the outstanding balances as at year end. After considering the probability of default, loss given default and forward-looking adjustments, management has assessed that no loss allowance is required as at 31 December 2019.

The measurement of allowance for ECL for trade receivables and amount due from an associated company is considered to be a key audit matter as it requires management to exercise judgement and make assumptions with respect to past events, current conditions and forecasts of future economic conditions as disclosed in Notes 3.4 and 27(b) to the financial statements.

Our audit procedures and response include:

- Obtaining an understanding and evaluating the Group's processes and ECL assessment for trade receivables and amount due from an associated company.
- For trade receivables, assessing the reasonableness of management's judgement and assumptions applied in the ECL model such as management's determination of historical credit loss rates, the application of respective ECL rates for each category of past due status of debtors and debtors regarded as credit-impaired, and management's consideration of current conditions and forecast economic conditions specific to its trade receivables. Whereas for amount due from an associated company, assessing the reasonableness of management's judgement and assumptions applied in the ECL model such as assessment of the significant changes in credit risk since initial recognition, the probability of default, the loss given default rate and the forward-looking adjustment.
- Checking the arithmetic accuracy of management's computation of ECL and for trade receivables, testing management's categorisation of debtors by their past due status.
- Reviewing the adequacy of disclosures relating to the ECL assessment of trade receivables and amount due from an associated company and the Group's credit risk made in the financial statements.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

These notes form an integral part of and should be read in conjunction with the accompanying financial statements.

1 Corporate information

The Company (Co. Reg. No. 199906220H) is incorporated and domiciled in Singapore and is listed on the Catalyst of the Singapore Exchange Securities Trading Limited ("SGX-ST"). The address of its registered office is Harvest @ Woodlands 280 Woodlands Industrial Park E5 #10-50, Singapore 757322.

On 21 November 2019, the Company's name was changed from Vashion Group Ltd. to Incredible Holdings Ltd..

The principal activities of the Company are those of provision of management and accounting services to its subsidiaries and including that of investment holding.

The principal activities of the subsidiaries and associated companies are shown in Notes 15 and 16 to the financial statements, respectively.

2 Summary of significant accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements are expressed in Singapore dollar ("S\$"), which is the Company's functional currency. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act, Chapter 50 and Singapore Financial Reporting Standards (International) ("SFRS(I)"). The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except as disclosed in the accounting policies below.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with SFRS(I) requires the use of estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the financial year. Although these estimates are based on management's best knowledge of current events and actions and historical experiences and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, actual results may ultimately differ from these estimates.

The Company's separate financial statements have been prepared on the same basis, and as permitted by the Companies Act, Chapter 50, the Company's separate statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income is not presented.

Use of estimates and judgements

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The areas involving a higher degree of judgement in applying accounting policies, or areas where assumptions and estimates have a significant risk of resulting in material adjustment within the next financial year are disclosed in Note 3 to the financial statements.

The carrying amounts of cash and cash equivalents, trade and other receivables and payables approximate their respective fair values due to the relatively short-term maturity of these financial instruments.

New and revised standards

In the current financial year, the Group has adopted all the new and revised SFRS(I) and SFRS(I) Interpretations ("SFRS(I) INT") that are relevant to its operations and effective for the current financial year. Changes to the Group's accounting policies have been made as required, in accordance with the transitional provisions in the respective SFRS(I) and SFRS(I) INT.

The adoption of these new/revised SFRS(I) and SFRS(I) INT did not have any material effect on the financial results or position of the Group and the Company except as disclosed below.

SFRS(I) 16 Leases

When the Group and the Company are the lessee

SFRS(I) 16 replaces the existing SFRS(I) 1-17 *Leases* for financial periods beginning 1 January 2019. It reforms lessee accounting by introducing a single lessee accounting model. Lessees are required to recognise all leases on their statements of financial position to reflect their rights to use leased assets (a "right-of-use" asset) and the associated obligations for lease payments (a lease liability), with limited exemptions for short term leases (less than 12 months) and leases of low value items. In addition, the nature of expenses related to those leases will change as SFRS(I) 16 replaces the straight-line operating lease expense with depreciation charge of right-of-use asset and interest expense on lease liability.

On adoption of SFRS(I) 16, the Group and the Company recognised lease liabilities in relation to leases which had previously been classified as "Operating Leases" under SFRS(I) 1-17 *Leases*. These liabilities were measured at the present value of the remaining lease payments, discounted using the Group's incremental borrowing rate as at 1 January 2019. The Group's weighted average lessee's incremental borrowing rate applied to the lease liabilities on 1 January 2019 was 6.5%. 2.2 Revenue recognition

Sale of goods

Revenue is recognised at a point in time when the Group satisfies a performance obligation by transferring the promised goods to the customer, which is when the customer obtains control of the goods upon delivery. The amount of revenue recognised is the amount allocated to the satisfied performance obligation. No element of financing is deemed present as the sales are made with the credit term of 30 days, which is consistent with market practice. A receivable is recognised when the goods are delivered as this is the point in time that the consideration is unconditional because only the passage of time is required before the payment is due. The Group does not provide right of return or warranty to its customers and hence, there is no refund liability or provision for warranty made.

Revenue from services

The Group provides electrical switch box design and assembly services. Such services are recognised at a point in time when the Group satisfies a performance obligation by rendering the services to the customer, which is when the customer obtains benefits of the service. Revenue is measured based on the consideration to which the Group expects to be entitled in exchange for rendering the services to the customer, excluding amounts collected on behalf of third parties. The amount of revenue recognised is the amount allocated to the satisfied performance obligation.

Interest income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method.

Dividend income

Dividend income is recognised when the Group's right to receive payment is established.

2.3 Subsidiaries

Subsidiaries are entities controlled by the Group. The Group controls an entity when the Group is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the entity.

In the Company's separate financial statements, investments in subsidiaries are accounted for at cost less impairment losses. On disposal of the investment, the difference between disposal proceeds and the carrying amounts of the investments are recognised in profit or loss.

2.4 Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements comprise the financial statements of the Company and its subsidiaries as at the end of the reporting period. Subsidiaries are consolidated from the date on which the Group obtains control, and continue to be consolidated until the date that such control ceases.

The financial statements of the subsidiaries are prepared for the same reporting date as the parent company. Consistent accounting policies are applied for like transactions and events in similar circumstances.

Intragroup balances and transactions, including income, expenses and dividends, are eliminated in full. Profits and losses resulting from intragroup transactions that are recognised in assets, such as inventory and plant and equipment, are eliminated in full.

Business combinations are accounted for using the acquisition method. The consideration transferred for the acquisition comprises the fair value of the assets transferred, the liabilities incurred and the equity interests issued by the Group. The consideration transferred also includes the fair value of any contingent consideration arrangement and the fair value of any pre-existing equity interest in the subsidiary. Acquisition-related costs are recognised as expenses as incurred. Identifiable assets acquired and liabilities and contingent liabilities assumed in a business combination are measured initially at their fair values at the acquisition date.

Any excess of the fair value of the consideration transferred in the business combination, the amount of any non-controlling interest in the acquiree (if any) and the fair value of the Group's previously held equity interest in the acquiree (if any), over the fair value of the net identifiable assets acquired is recorded as goodwill. In instances where the latter amount exceeds the former and the measurement of all amounts has been reviewed, the excess is recognised as gain from bargain purchase in profit or loss on the date of acquisition.

When a change in the Company's ownership interest in a subsidiary results in a loss of control over the subsidiary, the assets and liabilities of the subsidiary including any goodwill, non-controlling interest and other components of equity related to the subsidiary are derecognised. Amounts recognised in other comprehensive income in respect of that entity are also reclassified to profit or loss or transferred directly to retained earnings if required by a specific SFRS(I).

Any retained equity interest in the previous subsidiary is remeasured at fair value at the date that control is lost. The difference between the carrying amount of the retained interest at the date control is lost, and its fair value is recognised in profit or loss.

2.5 Associated companies

An associated company is an entity over which the Group has significant influence but not control or joint control, over the financial and operating policies of the entity. Significant influence is presumed to exist generally when the Group holds 20% or more but not exceeding 50% of the voting power of another entity.

Investments in associated companies are accounted for in the consolidated financial statements using the equity method of accounting, less impairment losses, if any.

Investments in associated companies are initially recognised at cost. The cost of an acquisition is measured at the fair value of the assets given, equity instruments issued or liabilities incurred or assumed at the date of exchange, plus costs directly attributable to the acquisition.

Subsequent to initial recognition, the consolidated financial statements include the Group's share of the post-acquisition profit or loss and other comprehensive income of equity-accounted investees, after adjustments to align the accounting policies with those of the Group, from the date that significant influence commences until the date that significant influence ceases.

Distributions received from associated companies are adjusted against the carrying amount of the investment. When the Group's share of losses in an associated company equals or exceeds its interest in the associated company, including any other unsecured non-current receivables, the Group does not recognise further losses, unless it has obligations or has made payments on behalf of the associated company.

Any excess of the cost of acquisition over the Group's share of the net fair value of the identifiable assets, liabilities and contingent liabilities of the associated company recognised at the date of acquisition is recognised as goodwill. The goodwill is included within the carrying amount of the investment and is assessed for impairment as part of the investment. Any excess of the Group's share of the net fair value of the identifiable assets, liabilities and contingent liabilities over the cost of acquisition, after reassessment, is recognised immediately as income in the Group's profit or loss.

Where a group entity transacts with an associate of the Group, unrealised gains are eliminated to the extent of the Group's interest in relevant associate. Unrealised losses are also eliminated unless the transactions provide evidence of impairment of the assets transferred.

In the Company's financial statements, investments in associates are carried at cost less accumulated impairment loss. On disposal of investments in associates, the differences between the disposal proceeds and the carrying amounts of the investments are recognised in profit or loss.

2.6 Plant and equipment and depreciation

All plant and equipment are initially recognised at cost and subsequently carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment in value.

The cost of plant and equipment initially recognised includes its purchase price, and any cost that is directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management.

Dismantlement, removal or restoration costs are included as part of the cost of plant and equipment if the obligation for dismantlement, removal or restoration is incurred as a consequence of acquiring or using the assets.

The cost of replacing a component of an item of plant and equipment is recognised in the carrying amount of the item if it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied within the component will flow to the Group, and its cost can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of the replaced component is derecognised.

On disposal of a plant and equipment, the difference between the net disposal proceeds and its carrying amount is taken to profit or loss.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis to write off the cost of all plant and equipment over their expected useful lives. The estimated useful lives are as follows:

The residual values, estimated useful lives and depreciation method of plant and equipment are reviewed, and adjusted as appropriate, at the end of each reporting period. The effects of any revision are recognised in profit or loss when the changes arise.

Fully depreciated assets are retained in the financial statements until they are no longer in use.

2.7 Intangible assets

Intangible assets acquired separately are measured on initial recognition at cost. The cost of intangible assets acquired is their fair values as at the date of acquisition. Subsequent to initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less accumulated amortisation and impairment losses, if any. The useful lives of intangible assets are assessed to be either finite or indefinite.

Intangible assets with indefinite useful lives are tested for impairment annually either individually or at the cash-generating unit level. Such intangibles are not amortised. The useful life of an intangible asset with an indefinite life is reviewed annually to determine whether indefinite life assessment continues to be supportable. If not, the change in the useful life assessment from indefinite to finite is made on a prospective basis.

Membership rights

Acquired club membership is stated at cost less accumulated impairment loss. The club membership is assessed as having indefinite useful lives as the contracts are open ended and there is no foreseeable limit to the period over which the memberships are expected to generate cash to the Group. The club membership is tested for impairment annually in accordance with the accounting policy in Note 2.8. Gains or losses on disposal of a club membership are taken to profit or loss.

2.8 Impairment of non-financial assets

At the end of each reporting period, the Group assesses the carrying amounts of its non-financial assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any). Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Group estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset.

If the recoverable amount of an asset (or cash-generating unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (cash-generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss, unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the impairment loss is recognised in other comprehensive income up to the amount of any previous revaluation.

Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (cash-generating unit) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (cash-generating unit) in prior years. A previously recognised impairment for an asset other than goodwill is only reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the asset's recoverable amount since the last impairment loss was recognised. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss, unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the reversal of the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation increase.

2.9 Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost comprises direct materials and, where applicable, direct labour costs, other direct costs and those overheads that have been incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. Cost is determined on a weighted average basis. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the costs of completion and selling expenses.

The accounting policy for leases before 1 January 2019 is as follows:

When a Group entity is the lessee

Finance leases

Leases of plant and equipment where the Group assumes substantially all the risks and rewards incidental to ownership are classified as finance leases. Finance leases are capitalised at the inception of the lease at the lower of the fair value of the leased asset or the present value of the minimum lease payments. Each lease payment is allocated between reduction of the outstanding liability and finance charges. The finance charge is taken to profit or loss over the lease period so as to produce a constant periodic rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability for each period. The asset acquired under finance leases are depreciated over the shorter of the useful life of the asset or the lease term.

Operating leases

Leases where a significant portion of the risks and rewards incidental to ownership are retained by the lessor are classified as operating leases. Payments made under operating leases (net of any incentives received from the lessor) are taken to profit or loss on a straight-line basis over the period of the lease. Contingent rents, if any, are charged as expenses in the period in which they are incurred.

When an operating lease is terminated before the lease period has expired, any payment required to be made to the lessor by way of penalty is recognised as an expense in the period in which termination takes place.

The accounting policy for leases after 1 January 2019 is as follows:

The Group assesses at contract inception whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. That is, if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

When a Group entity is the lessee

The Group applies a single recognition and measurement approach for all contracts that are, or contain, a lease, except for short-term leases (i.e. for leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less from the commencement date and do not contain a purchase option) and leases of low-value assets (e.g. leases of tablet and personal computers, small items of office equipment and telephones). For these exempted leases, the Group recognises the lease payments as an operating expense on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease unless another systematic basis is more representative of the time pattern in which economic benefits from the leased assets are consumed.

Lease liabilities

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date, discounted by using the rate implicit in the lease. If this rate cannot be readily determined, the Group uses its incremental borrowing rate.

Lease payments included in the measurement of the lease liability comprise fixed lease payments (including in-substance fixed payments) less any lease incentives receivable, variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, and amounts expected to be paid under residual value guarantees. The lease payments also include the exercise price of a purchase option reasonably certain to be exercised by the Group and payments of penalties for terminating the lease, if the lease term reflects the Group exercising the option to terminate. Variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or a rate are recognised as expenses (unless they are incurred to produce inventories) in the period in which the event or condition that triggers the payment occurs.

Lease liabilities (cont'd)

The lease liability is presented as a separate line in the statements of financial position.

The lease liability is subsequently measured by increasing the carrying amount to reflect interest on the lease liability using the effective interest method, and reducing the carrying amount to reflect the lease payments made.

The Group remeasures the lease liability (and makes a corresponding adjustment to the related right-of-use asset) whenever there is a modification, a change in the lease term, a change in the lease payments (e.g., changes to future payments resulting from a change in an index or rate used to determine such lease payments) or a change in the assessment of an option to purchase the underlying asset.

Right-of-use assets

The Group recognises right-of-use assets at the commencement date of the lease (i.e., the date the underlying asset is available for use). The right-of-use assets comprise the initial measurement of the corresponding lease liability, lease payments made at or before the commencement date, initial direct cost, less any lease incentive received.

Whenever the Group incurs an obligation for costs to dismantle and remove a leased asset, restore the site on which it is located or restore the underlying asset to the condition required by the terms and conditions of the lease, a provision is recognised and measured under SFRS(I) 1-37. To the extent that the cost relates to a right-of-use asset, the costs are included in the related right-of-use asset, unless those costs are incurred to produce inventories.

Right-of-use assets are subsequently measured at cost, less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, and adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities. Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter period of the lease term and useful life of the underlying asset. If ownership of the leased asset transfers to the Group at the end of the lease term or the cost reflects the exercise of a purchase option, depreciation is calculated using the estimated useful life of the asset. The depreciation starts at the commencement date of the lease.

The right-of use assets are presented within "Plant and equipment" in the statements of financial position.

2.11 Income taxes

Income tax on the profit or loss for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Current and deferred tax are recognised in profit or loss except to the extent that they relate to items recognised outside profit or loss, either in other comprehensive income or directly in equity in which the tax is also recognised outside profit or loss (either in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively).

Current tax is the expected tax payable or recoverable on the taxable income for the current year, using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the end of the reporting period, and any adjustment to tax payable or recoverable in respect of previous years. Management periodically evaluates positions taken in tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulation is subject to interpretation. It establishes provisions, where appropriate, on the basis of amounts expected to be paid to the tax authorities.

Deferred income tax is provided using the liability method, on all temporary differences at the end of the reporting period arising between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts in the financial statements except where the deferred income tax arises from the initial recognition of goodwill or an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination, and at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting nor taxable profit or loss.

Deferred income tax is provided on temporary differences arising on investments in subsidiaries and associated companies and interests in joint arrangements, except where the timing of the reversal of the temporary difference can be controlled by the Group and it is probable that the temporary difference will not reverse in the foreseeable future.

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences can be utilised.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on currently enacted or substantively enacted tax rates at the end of the reporting period.

2.12 Financial assets

Recognition and derecognition

Regular way purchases and sales of financial assets are recognised on trade date - the date on which the Group commits to purchase or sell the asset. Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows from the financial assets have expired or have been transferred and the Group has transferred substantially all risks and rewards of ownership.

Financial assets are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets (other than financial assets at fair value through profit or loss) are added to the fair value of the financial assets on initial recognition. Trade receivables without a significant financing component is initially measured at transaction prices.

Classification and measurement

All financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets.

The Group classifies its financial assets at amortised cost.

The classification is based on the entity's business model for managing the financial asset and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets.

The Group reclassifies financial assets when and only when its business model for managing those assets changes.

Subsequent measurement

Debt instruments

Debt instruments include cash and cash equivalents, trade and other receivables (excluding prepayments). The Group's debt instruments are measured as follows:

Amortised cost

The Group measures financial assets at amortised cost if both of the following conditions are met:

- The financial asset is held within a business model with the objective to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows; and
- The contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specific dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Financial assets at amortised cost are subsequently measured using the effective interest rate (EIR) method and are subject to impairment. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the asset is derecognised, modified or impaired. Interest income from these financial assets is included in interest income using the EIR method.

Impairment

The Group recognises an allowance for expected credit losses ("ECLs") for financial assets carried at amortised cost. ECLs are based on the difference between the contractual cash flows due in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the Group expects to receive, discounted at an approximation of the original effective interest rate.

The impairment methodology applied depends on whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk. For credit exposures for which there has not been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, ECLs are provided for credit losses that result from default events that are possible within the next 12-months (a 12-month ECL). For those credit exposures for which there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, a loss allowance is required for credit losses expected over the remaining life of the exposure, irrespective of the timing of the default (a lifetime ECL).

For trade receivables that do not have a significant financing component, the Group applies a simplified approach to recognise a loss allowance based on lifetime ECLs at each reporting date. The Group has established a provision matrix that is based on its historical credit loss experience, adjusted as appropriate for current conditions and forward-looking factors specific to the debtors and the economic environment.

If the Group has measured the loss allowance for a financial asset at an amount equal to lifetime ECL in the previous reporting period, but determines at the current reporting date that the conditions for lifetime ECL are no longer met, the Group measures the loss allowance at an amount equal to 12-month ECL at the current reporting date.

The Group recognises an impairment gain or loss in profit or loss for all financial assets with a corresponding adjustment to their carrying amount through a loss allowance account.

Offset

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount presented on the statements of financial position when, and only when the Group has a legal right to offset the amounts and intends either to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

2.13 Cash and cash equivalents in the consolidated statement of cash flows

For the purpose of presentation in the consolidated statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and bank balances with financial institutions which are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

2.14 Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities include trade and other payables. Financial liabilities are recognised on the statement of financial position when, and only when, the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument. Financial liabilities are initially recognised at fair value plus directly attributable transaction costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is extinguished. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognised and through the amortisation process.

2.15 Share capital

Proceeds from issuance of ordinary shares are recognised as share capital in equity. Incremental costs directly attributable to the issuance of ordinary shares are deducted against share capital.

2.16 Provisions for other liabilities

Provisions are recognised when the Group has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past event, and it is probable that an outflow of economic resources will be required to settle that obligation and the amount can be estimated reliably. Provisions are measured at the management's best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the amount of the provision shall be discounted to present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects the current market assessment of the time value of money and risks specific to the obligation.

When discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to passage of time is recognised as a finance cost in profit or loss.

2.17 Borrowing costs

Borrowing costs, which comprise interest and other costs incurred in connection with the borrowing of funds, are capitalised as part of the cost of a qualifying asset if they are directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of that asset. Capitalisation of borrowing costs commences when the activities to prepare the asset for its intended use or sale are in progress and the expenditures and borrowing costs are incurred. Borrowing costs are capitalised until the asset is substantially completed for its intended use or sale. All other borrowing costs are recognised in the profit or loss using the effective interest method.

2.18 Employee benefits

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to a defined contribution retirement benefit plan are recorded as an expense as they fall due. The entity's legal or constructive obligation is limited to the amount that it is obligated to contribute for the Singapore employees to an independently administered fund (such as the Central Provident Fund in Singapore, a government managed defined contribution retirement benefit plan). Certain overseas subsidiaries have defined contribution retirement benefit plans in which employees are entitled to join upon fulfilling certain conditions. The assets of the fund may or may not be held separately from those of the entity in an independently administered fund. The entity contributes an amount equal to a fixed percentage of the salary of each participating employee.

Employee leave entitlement

Employee entitlements to annual leave and long-service leave are recognised when they accrue to employees. A provision is made for the estimated liability for annual leave and long-service leave as a result of services rendered by employees up to the end of the reporting period.

Share-based compensation

The Group grants performance bonus shares which is settled by granting ordinary shares of the Company to award directors/employees. The fair value of the director/employee services received in exchange for the grant of the performance bonus shares is recognised as an expense with a corresponding increase in the performance bonus share reserve when the vesting condition is achieved. The total amount to be recognised when the vesting condition is achieved is determined by reference to the fair value of the performance bonus shares granted on the date of grant. At the end of each reporting period, the Group revises its estimates of the number of shares under options that are expected to become exercisable on the vesting date and recognises the impact of the revision of the estimates in profit or loss, with a corresponding adjustment to the performance bonus share reserve. No expense is recognised for performance bonus shares that do not ultimately vest.

When the Company settles the performance bonus shares for the services received by its subsidiaries, there is no re-charge by the Company to the subsidiaries. The amount is recognised as an increase in the Company's investments in subsidiaries as it represented capital contribution to the subsidiaries.

When the performance bonus shares are issued, the related balance previously recognised in the performance bonus share reserve is credited to the share capital account when new ordinary shares of the Company are issued.

2.19 Foreign currencies

Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements of each entity in the Group are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates (the "functional currency"). The financial statements of the Group and the Company are presented in Singapore dollar, which is the Company's functional currency.

Transactions and balances

Transactions in a currency other than the functional currency ("foreign currency") are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Currency translation gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in profit or loss, except for currency translation differences on net investment in foreign operations and borrowings and other currency instruments qualifying as net investment hedges for foreign operations, which are included in the foreign currency translation reserve within equity in the consolidated financial statements. The foreign currency translation reserve is reclassified from equity to profit or loss of the Group on disposal of the foreign operation.

Non-monetary items measured at fair values in foreign currencies are translated using the exchange rates at the date when the fair values are determined.

Translation of Group entities' financial statements

The results and financial position of all the Group entities (none of which has the currency of a hyperinflationary economy) that have a functional currency different from the Group's presentation currency are translated into the presentation currency as follows:

- (i) Assets and liabilities are translated at the closing rates at the end of the reporting period;
- (ii) Income and expenses are translated at average exchange rates (unless the average is not a reasonable approximation of the cumulative effect of the rates prevailing on the transaction dates, in which case income and expenses are translated using the exchange rates at the dates of the transactions); and
- (iii) All resulting exchange differences are recognised in the foreign currency translation reserve within equity.

On consolidation, exchange differences arising from the translation of the net investment in foreign operations (including monetary items that, in substance, form part of the net investment in foreign entities), and other currency instruments designated as hedges of such investments, are taken to the foreign currency translation reserve.

Goodwill and fair value adjustments arising on the acquisition of a foreign operation are treated as assets and liabilities of the foreign operation and translated at the closing rate.

On disposal of a foreign group entity, the cumulative amount of the currency translation reserve relating to that particular foreign entity is reclassified from equity and recognised in profit or loss when the gain or loss on disposal is recognised.

2.20 Dividend

Interim dividends are recorded during the financial year in which they are declared payable.

Final dividends are recorded in the Group's financial statements in the period in which they are approved by the Company's shareholders.

2.21 Government grants

Government grants are recognised at their fair value where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attaching conditions will be complied with. Where the grant relates to an asset, the fair value is recognised as deferred capital grant on the statements of financial position and is amortised to profit or loss over the expected useful life of the relevant asset by equal annual instalments.

Where the grant relates to an expense item, it is recognised in profit or loss over the period necessary to match them on a systematic basis to the costs that it is intended to compensate.

2.22 Segment reporting

An operating segment is a component of the Group that engages in business activities from which it may earn revenues and incur expenses, including revenues and expenses that relate to transactions with other components of the Group. Operating segments are reported in a manner consistent with the internal reporting provided to the Group's chief operating decision maker for making decisions about allocating resources and assessing performance of the operating segments.

2.23 Non-current assets (or disposal groups) held for sale and discontinued operations

Non-current assets (or disposal groups) are classified as assets held for sale and stated at the lower of carrying amount and fair value less costs to sell if their carrying amount is recovered principally through a sale transaction rather than through continuing use. Any impairment loss on initial classification and subsequent measurement is recognised as an expense. Any subsequent increase in fair value less costs to sell (not exceeding the accumulated impairment loss that has been previously recognised) is recognised in profit or loss.

The assets are not depreciated or amortised while they are classified as held for sale.

A discontinued operation is a component of an entity that either has been disposed of, or that is classified as held for sale and

- (a) represents a separate major line of business or geographical area of operations; or
- (b) is part of a single co-ordinated plan to dispose of a separate major line of business or geographical area of operations; or
- (c) is a subsidiary acquired exclusively with a view to resale.

Classification as a discontinued operation occurs upon disposal or when the operation meets the criteria to be classified as held for sale, if earlier. When an operation is classified as a discontinued operation, the comparative statement of comprehensive income is re-presented as if the operation had been discontinued from the start of the comparative year.

3 Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

Critical judgements in applying the entity's accounting policies

In the process of applying the Group's accounting policies, which are described in Note 2, management has made the following judgements that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements (apart from those involving estimations, which are dealt in the preceding paragraphs).

3.1 Going Concern Assumption

For the financial year ended 31 December 2019, the Group incurred a total loss of \$2,379,128 (2018: \$1,934,190) and a comprehensive loss of \$2,268,428 (2018: \$2,033,637), and has net cash used in operating activities of \$366,366 (2018: \$3,590,206). These conditions may cast doubt on the ability of the Group to continue as a going concern and to realise its assets and discharge its liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

Notwithstanding the above, the directors of the Company believe that the use of the going concern assumption in the preparation and presentation of the financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2019 is appropriate after taking into consideration the following factors:

- (i) The Group has net current assets of \$2,694,664 and net total assets of \$3,931,371. Management will continue to monitor the costs of the Group closely and seek to improve the operating performance and cash flows of the Group. Management has assessed that the Group will have sufficient cash flows to satisfy its working capital requirements for the next 12 months from the date of the financial statements and to enable the Group to meet its obligations as and when they fall due; and
- (ii) Management will continue to evaluate various strategies to obtain alternative sources of finance and diversification of the Group's business activities. The Group has entered into the business of the retail and trading of consumer watches in the current financial year, and it has provided a new source of revenue and generate cash flows for the Group.

3.1 *Going Concern Assumption (cont'd)*

If the Group is unable to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future, the Group may be unable to discharge its liabilities in the normal course of business and adjustments may have to be made to reflect the situation that assets may need to be realised other than in the normal course of business and at amounts which could differ significantly from the amounts at which they are currently recorded in the statement of financial position. In addition, the Group may have to provide for further liabilities that might arise and to reclassify non-current assets and liabilities as current assets and liabilities. No such adjustments have been made to these financial statements.

3.2 *Arbitration Orders*

A wholly owned subsidiary, Luxury Watch Trading Limited ("LW") received three arbitration orders from the Shenzhen Arbitration Commission ("Orders") on 17 January 2018. The Orders relate to LW entering into guarantee agreements dated 14 November 2012, 20 November 2012 and 25 March 2013 (collectively, the "Guarantee Agreements") with the borrower, Raymond Fu Ngai Man ("Raymond" or "Borrower"), former general manager of Shenzhen Louis Gianni Costume Co. Ltd and lender, 潘少斌 ("Mr Poon") and 方國釗 ("Mr Fong") (the "Lenders") that in the event of default in payment by the Borrower, LW would be liable to make repayment to the Lenders.

Details of the Orders were as follows:

- Charge for the repayment of RMB10,490,000 (principal amount of RMB5,500,000 and interest and related expenses of RMB4,990,000) to Mr Poon;
- Charge for the repayment of RMB12,370,500 (principal amount of RMB6,500,000 and interest and related expenses of RMB5,870,500) to Mr Poon; and
- Charge for the repayment of RMB2,152,200 (principal amount of RMB1,000,000 and interest and related expenses of RMB1,152,200) to Mr Fong.

On 17 May 2018, LW received 3 additional arbitral orders dated 8 May 2018 made subsequent to the 3 orders received originally. The repayments were due in 10 days from the date of the orders dated 8 May 2018.

The Board of Directors of the Company (the "Board") confirmed that no corporate guarantee(s) has been provided by the Company or any of its subsidiaries to the Lenders for and on behalf of the Borrower. Both the Board and the directors of LW at the material time are not aware of the existence of the Guarantee Agreements.

The Board is of the view that the Orders are without merit because:

- (i) None of the directors of LW have entered into and/or have authorised any person to enter into any agreements with the Borrower and the Lenders to guarantee the obligations of the Borrower;
- (ii) No signature of any director or authorised person of LW was sighted in all Guarantee Agreements; and
- (iii) The company stamp which appears in the Guarantee Agreements is of a different size from the original LW's company stamp.

The Board believes that in the event that the award is made against LW ("Award"), the liability of the Company, being the sole shareholder of LW in the event of the winding-up of LW, will be capped to the amounts of capital contributed, the Company cannot be held liable in law for the sums in the Award. On 19 December 2019, the Group entered into a sale and purchase agreement to dispose the entire equity interest in LW to a director of the Company (see Note 11(a)).

Furthermore, there are no obligations or contractual or regulatory requirement for the Company or any of its other subsidiaries to fulfil or indemnify any obligations or owing of LW.

For the financial year ended 31 December 2019, no provision and contingent liabilities have been made by the Group and the Company in regards to the arbitration orders.

Key sources of estimation uncertainty

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period, that has a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

3.3 Net realisable value of inventories

A review is made on inventory for excess inventory and declines in net realisable value below cost and an allowance is recorded against the inventory balance for any such declines. The review require management to consider the future demand for the products. In any case the realisable value represents the best estimates of the recoverable amount and is based on the acceptable evidence available at the end of the reporting period and inherently involves estimates regarding the future expected realisable value. The considerations for determining the amount of allowance or write-down include ageing analysis and subsequent events. In general, such an evaluation process requires significant judgement and its results may materially affect the carrying value of inventories at the end of the reporting period. Possible changes in these estimates could result in revisions to the carrying value of the inventories. The carrying value of inventories at the end of the financial year is disclosed in Note 17.

3.4 Calculation of loss allowance

Management determines the expected credit losses ("ECL") of trade receivables by applying the simplified approach and using the provision matrix to measure the lifetime ECL for trade receivables. The Group categorises its trade receivables by its past due status and segregates debtors regarded as credit-impaired where one or more credit impairment events have occurred. The ECL rates for each category of debtors are estimated based on historical credit loss experience adjusted as appropriate to reflect current conditions and forecasts of future economic conditions.

When measuring ECL of other receivables, the Group uses reasonable and supportable forward-looking information, which is based on assumptions and forecasts of future economic conditions. Loss given default is an estimate of the loss arising on default. It is based on the difference between the contractual cash flows due and those that the lender would expect to receive, taking into account cash flows from collateral and integral credit enhancements.

Probability of default constitutes a key input in measuring ECL of other receivables. Probability of default is an estimate of the likelihood of default over a given time horizon, the calculation of which includes historical data, assumptions and expectations of future conditions.

As the calculation of loss allowance on receivables and loans is subject to assumptions and forecasts, any changes to these estimations will affect the amounts of loss allowance recognised and the carrying amounts of receivables and loans. Details of ECL measurement and carrying values of trade receivables and other receivables at the end of the financial year are disclosed in Note 27.

3.5 *Impairment of investments in subsidiaries and associated companies*

The Company reviews the investments in subsidiaries and associated companies at the reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount (i.e. higher of the fair value less cost to sell and value in use) of the asset is estimated to determine the impairment loss. Fair value less cost to sell calculation is based on observable market prices or market valuations less incremental costs for disposing asset. When value in use calculations are undertaken, management must estimate the expected future cash flows from the asset or cash-generating unit and choose a suitable discount rate in order to calculate the present value of those cash flows. The carrying amount of the Company's investments in subsidiaries and associates as at the end of the financial year are disclosed in Notes 15 and 16, respectively.

3.6 *Determining the lease term*

In determining the lease term, management considers all facts and circumstances that create an economic incentive to exercise an extension option, or not to exercise a termination option. Extension options (or periods after termination options) are only included in the lease term if the lease is reasonably certain to be extended (or not terminated).

For leases of office units, the following factors are considered to be most relevant:

- If there are significant penalties to terminate the lease, the Group will typically reasonably certain not to terminate the lease;
- Otherwise, the Group considers other factors including its historical lease periods and the costs and business disruption required to replace the leased asset.

The assessment of reasonable certainty to exercise extension options is only revised if a significant change in circumstances occurs which affects this assessment, and that is within the control of the lessee.

3.7 *Estimating the incremental borrowing rate for leases*

The Group uses the incremental borrowing rate to measure the lease liabilities because the interest rate implicit in the lease is not readily determinable. The incremental borrowing rate is the rate of interest that a lessee would have to pay to borrow over a similar term, and with a similar security, the funds necessary to obtain an asset of a similar value to the right-of-use asset in a similar economic environment. The incremental borrowing rate therefore reflects what the Group "would have to pay", which requires estimation when no observable rates are available (such as for subsidiaries that do not enter into financing transactions) or when they need to be adjusted to reflect the terms and conditions of the lease. The Group estimates the incremental borrowing rate using observable inputs such as market interest rates, where available and made certain entity-specific estimates, such as the Company and the subsidiaries' stand-alone credit rating. Any change in estimation of incremental borrowing rate may have a significant impact to the determination of lease liabilities and right-of-use assets at the date of initial application of SFRS(I) 16. The carrying amount of lease liabilities and right-of-use assets as at the end of the financial year are disclosed in Notes 22 and 13.

- (b) On 23 December 2019, the Group entered into a sale and purchase agreement with Yap Soo Kiat, who is the director of the Switech Systems & Marketing Pte Ltd ('Switech') for the sale of its entire equity interest in subsidiary, Switech at a consideration of \$1, payable in cash on the date when the share sale and purchase agreement is signed.

As at report date, the disposal of share capital in both subsidiaries, LW and Switech are not completed yet and management expects the disposal to be completed after approval by SGX.

The entire assets and liabilities relating to LW and Switech have been presented as disposal group classified as held-for-sale in the consolidated statement of financial position of the Group at 31 December 2019, and the entire financial performance of LW and Switech were presented in a single amount separately on the consolidated income statement of the Group as "Discontinued Operations".

In addition to LW and Switech, for the financial year ended 31 December 2019, the entire financial performance of the subsidiaries, Sansim Cosmetics (H.K.) Ltd ('Sansim'), FBT HK Limited ('FBT') and Vashion Assets Management Limited ('VAM') (2018: PT. Louis Gianni ('PTLG'), Sansim, FBT and VAM), were presented as "Discontinued Operations". These subsidiaries were formerly engaged in trading or wholesale of garments and cosmetics products or provision of consultancy services. These subsidiaries have either ceased operations or remained inactive since prior years and have remained dormant in the Group. FBT has been liquidated during the financial year ended 31 December 2019 and management have commenced the process of liquidation for Sansim and VAM.

In 2018, following the allotment and issuance of the 1,086,345,633 Rights Shares and 543,172,816 Warrants pursuant to the renounceable non-underwritten Rights Issue with Warrants on 12 March 2018, the number of issued and paid up Shares in the capital of the Company has increased from 113,030,287 shares to 1,199,375,920 shares as at 31 December 2018.

The Incredible PSP shall continue in force at the discretion of the Remuneration Committee, subject to a maximum period of 10 years commencing on the date on which the Incredible PSP is adopted.

(b) Financial risks management

The Group and Company are exposed to financial risks arising from their operations and the use of financial instruments. The key financial risks include foreign currency risk, interest rate risk, credit risk and liquidity risk. The Group's overall risk management strategy is to minimise the effects of these risks by continually monitoring the financial risk management process to ensure that an appropriate balance between risk and control is achieved. The Board of Directors is responsible for setting the objectives and policies implemented to mitigate the risk exposures. The Group has not used any derivatives or other instruments for hedging purposes. The Group does not hold or issue derivative financial instruments for trading purposes.

The directors provide written principles for overall risk management, as well as written policies covering specific areas, such as foreign exchange risk, interest rate risk, credit risk. Such written policies are reviewed annually.

The following sections provide details regarding the Group's and the Company's exposure to the above-mentioned financial risks and the objectives, policies and processes for the management of these risks.

Foreign exchange risk

The Group has currency exposures arising from transactions, assets and liabilities that are denominated in currencies other than the respective functional currencies of entities in the Group. The foreign currencies in which the Group's currency risk arises are mainly United States Dollar ('USD'), Hong Kong Dollar ('HKD') and Pound Sterling ('GBP').

The Group is also exposed to currency translation risk arising from its net investment in its foreign operation in other countries mainly Hong Kong and Indonesia. The Group does not have a policy to hedge its exposure to foreign currency risk. The Group's net investments in Hong Kong and Indonesia are not hedged as currency positions in Hong Kong and Indonesia are considered to be long-term in nature.

Interest rate risk

The Group's and the Company's exposure to interest rate risk is minimal as the impacts of interest rate fluctuations on the Group's and the Company's interest bearing assets and liabilities are not significant.

Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that a counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial loss to the Group. The Group minimises credit risk by dealing exclusively with high credit rating counterparties. The Group has adopted a policy of only dealing with creditworthy counterparties. The Group performs ongoing credit evaluation of its counterparties' financial condition and generally do not require a collateral.

The Group does not have significant credit exposure except that the Group's trade receivables comprise 1 debtor (2018: 1 debtor) that individually represented 81% (2018: 82%) of Group trade receivables. The Company has no significant concentration of credit risk except for the receivables from subsidiaries and an associated company as disclosed in Note 18.

The Group considers available reasonable and supportive forward-looking information which includes internal credit rating, external credit rating, actual or expected significant adverse changes in business, financial or economic conditions that are expected to cause a significant change to the debtor's ability to meet its obligations, actual or expected significant changes in the operating results of the debtor, significant increases in credit risk on other financial instruments of the same debtor and significant changes in the expected performance and behaviour of the debtor, including changes in the payment status of debtors in the group and changes in the operating results of the debtor.

- existing or forecast adverse changes in business, financial or economic conditions that are expected to cause a significant decrease in the debtor's ability to meet its debt obligations;
- significant increases in credit risk on other financial instruments of the same debtor;
- an actual or expected significant adverse change in the regulatory, economic, or technological environment of the debtor that results in a significant decrease in the debtor's ability to meet its debt obligations.

The Group regularly monitors the effectiveness of the criteria used to identify whether there has been a significant increase in credit risk and revises them as appropriate to ensure that the criteria are capable of identifying significant increase in credit risk before the amount becomes past due.

Regardless of the evaluation of the above factors, the Group presumes that the credit risk on a financial asset has increased significantly since initial recognition when contractual payments are more than 30 days past due, unless the Group has reasonable and supportable information that demonstrates otherwise.

The Group also assumes that the credit risk on a financial instrument has not increased significantly since initial recognition if the financial asset is determined to have low credit risk at the reporting date. A financial instrument is determined to have low credit risk if it has an internal or external credit rating of "investment grade" as per globally understood definition, or the financial asset has a low risk of default; the borrower has a strong capacity to meet its contractual cash flow obligations in the near term; and adverse changes in economic and business conditions in the longer term may, but will not necessarily, reduce the ability of the borrower to fulfil its contractual cash flow obligations.

Definition of default

The Group has determined the default events on a financial asset to be when there is evidence that the borrower is unlikely to pay its credit obligations to the Group in full, without recourse by the Group to actions such as realising security (if any is held) or the financial asset is more than 365 days past due.

The Group considers the above as constituting an event of default for internal credit risk management purposes as historical experience indicates that receivables that meet either of the following criteria are generally not recoverable.

Irrespective of the above analysis, the Group considers that default has occurred when a financial asset is more than 365 days past due unless the Group has reasonable and supportable information to demonstrate that a more lagging default criterion is more appropriate.

Credit-impaired financial assets

A financial asset is credit-impaired when one or more events that have a detrimental impact on the estimated future cash flows of that financial asset have occurred, such as evidence that the borrower is in significant financial difficulty, there is a breach of contract such as default or past due event; there is information that it is becoming probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or other financial reorganisation; the disappearance of an active market for that financial asset because of financial difficulties; or the purchase or origination of a financial asset at a deep discount that reflects the incurred credit losses.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Group or the Company will encounter difficulty in meeting financial obligations due to shortage of funds. The Group's and the Company's exposure to liquidity risk arises primarily from mismatches of the maturities of the financial assets and liabilities.

The Group and the Company monitor its liquidity risk and maintains a level of cash and cash equivalents deemed adequate by management to finance the Group's and the Company's operations and to mitigate the effects of fluctuations in cash flows. For the current financial year, the Group has net cash outflow from its operations. Notwithstanding this, management ensure the Group and the Company have sufficient cash resources on demand to meet expected operational expenses including the servicing of financial obligations.

30 Capital management

The objective when managing capital are to safeguard the reporting entity's ability to continue as a going concern, so that it can continue to provide returns for owners and benefits for other stakeholders, and to provide an adequate return to owners by pricing the sales commensurately with the level of risk. The management sets the amount of capital to meet its requirements and the risk taken. There were no changes in the approach to capital management during the reporting year. The management manages the capital structure and makes adjustments to it where necessary or possible in the light of changes in conditions and the risk characteristics of the underlying assets. In order to maintain or adjust the capital structure, the management may adjust the amount of dividends paid to owners, return capital to owners, issue new shares, or sell assets to reduce debt. Adjusted capital comprises all components of equity (that is, share capital and reserves).

The Group and the Company do not have any external borrowings. The debt-to-adjusted capital ratio therefore does not provide a meaningful indicator of the risk of borrowings.

The Group and the Company are not subject to any externally imposed capital requirements for the financial years ended 31 December 2019 and 2018.

31 Subsequent events

- i. On 8 January 2020, the Group entered into a sale and purchase agreement to sell its entire equity interest in an associate, PT. Louis Gianni ('PTLG') at an agreed consideration of \$1,100,000 (equivalent to IDR11,336,699) to a third party.
- ii. On 11 March 2020, the World Health Organisation declared the Coronavirus ("Covid-19") outbreak as a pandemic in recognition of its rapid spread across the globe. The emergence of Covid-19 since early 2020 has brought about uncertainties to the Group's operating environment and has impacted the Group's operations in Singapore and Hong Kong and its financial position subsequent to the financial year end. The Group is cognizant of the challenges posed by these developing events and the potential impact on the business sector of the Group. The Group will continuously assess the situation, work closely with the local authorities to support their efforts in containing the spread of Covid-19, and put in place measures to minimise impact to its business.

For the Group's financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2019, the Covid-19 outbreak and the related impacts are considered non-adjusting events in accordance with SFRS(I) 1-10 Events after the Reporting Period. Consequently, there is no impact on the recognition and measurement of assets and liabilities as at 31 December 2019.

The Group is unable to reasonably estimate the financial impact of Covid-19 for the financial year ending 31 December 2020 to be disclosed in the financial statements as the situation is still evolving and the uncertainty of the outcome of the current events. It is however certain that the local and worldwide measures against the spread of the Covid-19 will have adverse effects on the Group's sales, operations and supply chains. The Group and the Company will continuously monitor the impact of Covid-19 on its operations and its financial performance. The Group will also be taking appropriate and timely measures to minimise the impact of the outbreak on the Group's operations.
